Minutes

Gibson Baptist Association Annual Meeting
The Church at Sugar Creek – Humboldt, Tennessee – October 24, 2022

1. Call to Order – The meeting was called to order at 5:45 by Bro. Bryan Morris, moderator, pastor at New Hope. Eighty-eight (88) messengers were present representing twenty-nine (29) churches.
2. Welcome and Prayer – Dr. Greg McFadden, pastor of Sugar Creek, welcomed the congregation and led the opening prayer.
3. Adoption of Program/Seating of the Messengers – The Leadership Team recommended that the messengers be seated, and the program be adopted. Joey Hufstedler seconded the motion. The motion carried.
4. Congregational Song – Kevin Hamilton, music director at Sugar Creek, led the congregation in the hymn “Nothing but the Blood of Jesus.”
5. Financial Report – GBA Treasurer Jim Acree, member FBC Dyer, gave the financial report. He stated that we took in more than we spent so we did well this year. We started the year with \$135,667 and ended the year with \$134,558.81. He also said we would move the \$27,000 over the \$50,000 in the budget to the contingency fund.
6. Nominating Committee Report – Sherry Scruggs, chairman of nominating committee, member of Hickory Grove, recommended the new members for the committees. The new members were accepted by acclamation.
7. Budget Committee Report – Committee Chair Greg Pillow, member Midway, gave the recommendation from the budget committee to increase the budget for 2022/2023 by \$8,695 for the grand total of \$209,615. Dr. Jason Bowen, pastor FBC Trenton, seconded the motion. the motion carried.
8. Miscellaneous Business – Bro. Joel Pigg, chairman of DOM search committee, pastor at Salem, reported that the committee received resumes in July and August. They received 23 resumes, narrowed the field to 4, and now to just 2 candidates. He asked for prayer for the committee, and Bro. Bryan Morris led in prayer for the committee.
9. Send Team Recommendation – Joey Hufstedler, leader of Send team, pastor at Poplar Grove, recommended that the Wingo Offering goal for 2022-2023 be \$23,500 with the distribution as follows: 70% IMB Projects, 25% North American/TBMB/GBA Projects, and 5% Disaster Relief. They also recommended that the International Missions Projects & Trips be as follows: First-time volunteers \$500 and repeat volunteers \$400. Rev. Andy King, pastor of Fruitland, seconded the recommendation, and it passed by acclamation.
10. WMU Report—Sheilah Spangler, WMU Director, member at Salem, talked about the GBA 100th anniversary in 2024. She also stated that the devotion and remembrance booklet will be available in September 2023.
11. Congregation Song – Kevin Hamilton led the congregation in the hymn “It is Well With my Soul.”
12. Moderator’s Message – Bryan Morris, pastor at New Hope, read Ezekiel 37:1-14 and talked about “Can these bones live?”. His 3 main points were as follows: 1) Give our attention to God, 2.) God can put anything back together, and 3.) God can bring whatever is dead back to life.

13. Election of Officers – Bryan Morris, moderator, asked for nominations for moderator for 2022-2023. Andy King, pastor at Fruitland, nominated James Rogers, pastor at Oakwood, for moderator. Randy Pool, pastor at FBC Medina, seconded the motion. The motion passed by acclamation. John Coleman, pastor at New Bethlehem nominated Johnny McCartney, pastor at Mt. Pleasant, as assistant moderator. Eston Hurst, member New Bethlehem, seconded the motion, and the motion carried. Leann Cherry was nominated by Andy King to serve as clerk, and Eston Hurst seconded. The motion carried. Jim Acree was nominated for treasurer by Andy King and the motion was seconded by Lane Self. The motion carried. Sheilah Spangler nominated Joel Pigg for assistant treasurer, and Michael Butler second the motion. The motion carried.

Executive Board Report

The Executive Board has as its purpose to conduct the business of the association between annual meetings. The Board is composed of one elected representative from each church and the pastor of the church. The Constitution and Bylaws require the board to meet quarterly. February Executive Board Meeting highlights:

The annual Jerry Legg Volunteer Missions Banquet was held on February 17th at Trenton First Baptist Church. Shelia Bell, member of Smyrna, was recognized as the mission volunteer of the year. The Senior Adult banquet was held at Dyer First Baptist Church on March 24th. Some of our bivocational pastors and wives attended the Bivocational Pastors & Wives Retreat in Pigeon Forge on January 27-29. GBA scholarships those who attend.

April Executive Board Meeting highlights:

Jim Acree, treasurer, reported that the Association was doing well financially. Bro. Roger informed the Board of his timeline for his retirement. He shared that his last day will be June 30, 2022. He announced that he will be moving to New Albany, Mississippi to be close to his children and grandchildren. Steve and Dottie Babcock spoke about their recent work with Ukraine Refugees in Romania. We were also excited to have Brother Willie McLaurin (current SBC Executive Committee President) to speak. He challenged us to "get outside the walls of our churches!" GBA along with several churches partnered with Fellowship of Christian Athletes again this year for the annual "Fields of Faith." The inclement weather caused the gathering to be moved inside the gym, but a really good crowd of young folks and leaders were blessed and challenged by Brother Ken Bowman's praise team and Brother Steve Gaines (pastor of Bellevue BC) as our speaker. There were 8 professions of faith and many other decisions for Christ!

Our presence at the Gibson County Fair and Youth Night at the Fair was a tremendous effort again this year. All Fair goers passed by our Prayer Tent with our volunteers ready and eager for Gospel conversations! An unknown amount of Gospel seeds were sown! We continue to rejoice at the decision by the Supreme Court to Protect Life and we realize that it is VERY important to continue our support of our Birth Choice Ministry! "The Battle Continues For Life, stay in the fight...!" Poverty and Addiction are major people enemies in our area and across our nation! Our efforts with Christian Women's Job Corp, Twice Blessed Ministry, and our Hope House are changing lives and making a difference! Praise the Lord for these Kingdom ministries!

The Block Party Trailer continues to be a valuable resource for our churches and is utilized regularly.

There were several "disasters" this past year that our association responded to with prayer and with resources. A total of \$80,288.39 was given for disasters with floods in Waverly, TN, and Kentucky, the refugees in the Ukraine, and tornado relief in Kenton and Bethpage Baptist Church. Praise the Lord for an amazing and wonderful response by Baptist folks in our association.

Our Wingo funds supported GBA volunteers internationally in Romania and Panama. And, here in the States Wingo funds supported volunteers in Townsend, Tennessee.

With funds given to GBA due to the transition of the former "Connect" church, to the "Elevate" church, we have repaved our parking lot, and we are planning, very soon, to construct a 24'X24' shed (with help from volunteers), for our Block Party trailer and our Disaster Trailer. Additionally with the remaining funds in this account, we are planning to renovate and update the GBA sign in front of our property.

As a previous effort to begin Hispanic initiatives did not develop, we are now in the process of praying and pursuing a new Hispanic ministry possibility, in partnership with Tennessee Baptist Mission Board, The Church at Sugar Creek, and Fruitland Baptist Church.

A while ago as, you may remember, the Disaster Trailer was stolen from our property with our DR chain saws and equipment inside the trailer. Later, the trailer was recovered, but the equipment was never recovered. The trailer has been empty since that time. We are in the process of re-equipping the trailer. However, our discussion and intent is that we would utilize the trailer for a dual purpose, DR equipment (i.e. chain saws, generator, tarps, etc.), and Project/Ministry equipment (i.e. shovels, rakes, ladders, power saws, saw horses, small project equipment, etc.). Thus, we will be equipped with DR and Ministry Project items. The trailer would be available to our churches for projects like “fix up,” ramp construction, painting, yard projects, gutter cleaning, for ministry projects organized by youth groups, men’s ministry, etc. We already have some of the equipment and we will be gathering other items soon. Also, we will be working on guidelines and requirements for use of the DR & Ministry Trailer.

Several years ago, in the association’s “policy and procedures” manual a policy was established which states that at the end of each annual meeting of the association, if there is a “carry over” balance of more than \$50,000. any amount above that \$50,000. would be transferred into the Contingency Reserve Fund account. Due to that policy and due to the balance on hand in the General Budget funds account being \$77,206.42, a transfer of \$27,206. will be made immediately. Thus, the General Fund account will begin the 2022-2023 association year with a balance carried forward of \$50,000. Thank You Gibson Baptist Churches for faithfully supporting local missions and our joint efforts together!

2022-2023 GUIDELINES FOR WINGO MISSION FUNDS

To receive Wingo Funds for any mission trip or project, all volunteers must undergo a background check with the GBA. This requirement follows the mission sending agencies of the Southern Baptist Convention and is for the legal prudence of the GBA. No funds will be dispersed for any trip or project until the background screening requirements are complete, and payment has been received.

BACKGROUND SCREENING REQUIREMENTS

- 1) Volunteers must submit three references using the reference forms provided by the GBA. The references must be from individuals who are not family members of the volunteers and must be at least 21 years of age. One of the three references must be from the pastor of the church where the volunteer is a member. In cases where the church is without a pastor, a staff member or chairman of deacons may serve as a reference.
- 2) Volunteers must complete a personal interview questionnaire form provided by the GBA.
- 3) Volunteers under the age 18 are only required to submit reference forms and the personal interview questionnaire.
- 4) Volunteers who are older than 18 must have a background check through the company used by the GBA. A consent form will be provided for the volunteer to grant permission for the background check.
- 5) The volunteer will be responsible for paying the fee for the background check.
- 6) Volunteers are required to watch a child protection video provided by the GBA.
- 7) Volunteers are required to undergo background screening every four years with the GBA.
- 8) Churches participating in a mission trip other than a GBA led trip, shall conduct the background screening as outlined above. All background screening forms shall be maintained on file with the church. GBA will make available online background checks for churches. When a church has completed the background screening, an authorized representative of the church must sign a declaration statement provided by GBA, verifying that the background screening has been completed for every mission volunteer receiving Wingo Funds. Background screenings are valid for four years. In cases where a church receives a Church Scholarship (Multiple Scholarship), the same procedures must be followed along with a signed declaration statement to the GBA. Wingo funds will not be granted until such procedures are completed.

INTERNATIONAL MISSIONS PROJECTS

GBA Volunteers and churches participating in an official project of the Gibson Baptist Association, the Tennessee Baptist Convention, or the International Mission Board are eligible for travel assistance from the Wingo Fund account. Scholarships from this account primarily seek to encourage and help GBA volunteers (ages 15+ or a student who has completed 9th grade) to participate in a 'first time' mission trip. The following guidelines apply for use of Wingo Funds:

- 1) Funds are designed to assist volunteers who participate in an official IMB trip/project. First time international mission volunteers are eligible for a scholarship of **\$500**.
- 2) Volunteers who have previously participated in an official IMB project/trip are eligible for a **\$400** scholarship once per associational calendar year if it is an IMB project/trip.
- 3) Churches may request a scholarship for volunteer team members of the same church once per calendar yr.
 - A multiple scholarship is designated when a group of volunteers from a single church participate in same project/trip.
 - A multiple scholarship amount will be limited to \$3,000 for the project/trip.
 - Only one multiple scholarship can be granted to a single church in the calendar year.
 - Additional scholarships may be awarded to other individuals of a church that has received a multiple scholarship (under existing guidelines) up to \$1,000 over and above the multiple scholarship.
 - Scholarship requests that exceed the \$3,000 limit for a church may be considered by the Send Team.
 - It is encouraged that first time volunteers be distributed their full \$500 scholarship from this amount, if possible.
- 4) Volunteers (first time or otherwise) not participating in a multiple scholarship project/trip with their church are still eligible for an individual scholarship once during the association calendar year.
- 5) Volunteers requesting funds must complete an application, available at the GBA office or by e- mail.
- 6) Wingo funds will be disbursed as early as possible with adequate notice prior to the date of the project/trip. Special considerations may be submitted to GBA.
- 7) Any special requests/needs for funds not addressed in these guidelines may be addressed to the necessary channel of the Send Team.
- 8) To help and encourage pastors who have never participated in an IMB international mission trip while serving as a GBA pastor, a \$ 1,000 pastor's scholarship will be available for five pastors each year (first come, first serve basis). To qualify, this must be the pastor's first IMB international mission trip as a GBA pastor. The pastor will still be eligible to receive Wingo funds for first-time mission volunteers along with this scholarship. It must be an official trip of the International Mission Board and be in compliance with all guidelines for Wingo mission funds.

DISASTER RELIEF PROJECTS

- 1) International disaster relief projects will qualify for travel assistance for GBA volunteers as listed above. However, for International Disaster Relief Projects, the minimum amount from this fund shall be \$500 for any volunteer from GBA, regardless of the number of trips/projects the volunteer may have participated in.
- 2) Matching funds from the local church is encouraged.
- 3) The maximum total contribution to volunteers from a single church for any specific project/trip travel assistance is \$2,000.
- 4) USA disaster relief projects qualify for gasoline reimbursement for volunteers from GBA going to a disaster point as called upon by the GBA or TBC.
- 5) An allocation of up to \$1,000 may be given to any area where a disaster has occurred. The gift and amount is to be determined by the Send Team of the association.

NORTH AMERICAN MISSIONS PROJECTS

GBA Volunteers and churches participating in an official project of the Gibson Baptist Association, the Tennessee Baptist Convention, or the North American Mission Board are eligible for travel assistance from the Wingo Fund account. Scholarships from this account primarily seek to encourage and help GBA volunteers (ages 13 and older or a student who has completed 7th grade) to participate in a 'first time' mission trip. The following guidelines apply for use of Wingo Funds:

- 1) Funds are designed to assist volunteers who participate in an official GBA, TBC, or NAMB trip/project more than 200 miles round trip from the Gibson Baptist Association Office out of state. First Time North American mission volunteers are eligible for a scholarship of \$150.
- 2) Volunteers who have previously participated in an official North American Mission project/trip are eligible for a \$100 scholarship once per associational calendar year if it is a North American Mission project/trip.
- 3) Churches may request a multiple scholarship for volunteer team members of same church once in the calendar year.
 - A multiple scholarship is designated when a group of volunteers from a single church participate in the same project/trip.
 - A multiple scholarship amount will be limited to \$1,000 for the project/trip.
 - Only one multiple scholarship can be granted to a single church in the calendar year.
 - Additional scholarships may be awarded to other individuals of a church that has received a multiple scholarship (under existing guideline) up to \$375 over and above the multiple scholarship.
 - Scholarship requests that exceed the \$1,375 limit for a church may be considered by the Send Team.
 - It is encouraged that first time volunteers be distributed their full \$150 scholarship from this amount, if possible.
- 4) Volunteers (first time or otherwise) not participating in a multiple scholarship project/trip with their church are still eligible for an individual scholarship once during the association calendar year.
- 5) Volunteers requesting funds must complete an application which is available at the GBA office or by e-mail.
- 6) Wingo funds will be disbursed as early as possible with adequate notice prior to the date of the project/trip. Special considerations may be submitted to GBA.
- 7) Any special requests/needs for funds not addressed in these guidelines may be addressed to the necessary channel of the Send Team.

WINGO OFFERING

Each year the Send Team of the association will recommend a goal for the Wingo Offering at the Annual Meeting of the GBA. Gifts from churches or individuals for these accounts are welcomed anytime during the budget year. However, a recommended date for receiving the Wingo Offering in the churches is the last Sunday of each month, May through September each year. Fund allocations from donations/offering will be determined by the Send Team each year. The Wingo Offering is named in honor of Rev. Charles Wingo, first Director of Missions, GBA. Wingo Funds exist to encourage volunteers and church participation.

Brazil Mission Report

Over the years GBA volunteers have worked in two mission points to help plant churches in the city. The Mount Moriah Baptist Church held a dedication for their new church building. Bro. Roger was invited to preach the dedication sermon. This was a special service held on Saturday night with guests from the local association and other churches attending. On Sunday, Earl and Bro. Roger preached at the Mount Sinai Baptist Church. This is another church plant where volunteers from GBA have served. The church dedicated their new education facility and sanctuary renovation.

Brazil mission teams will be serving during the year in Rio de Janeiro and Cascavel, Paraná. Pray about joining one of the teams this year.

Wingo Fund Report

This year the Wingo offering goal was set at \$23,500. Our GBA churches and individuals gave a total of \$14,413.56. Last year our churches gave \$30,649.87. The Wingo funds are used to assist volunteers in participating in mission projects and trips during the year. We are thankful for our churches and individuals who give faithfully to support missions and the Wingo offering.

Wingo Funds were used this past year to help eleven (11) individuals from three (3) churches receive Wingo scholarships that helped with the cost of their mission trips to two (2) countries. Last year thirteen (13) volunteers from ten (10) churches received Wingo funds to travel to three (3) countries.

WMU Annual Report 2021-2022

The Associational WMU has had a very good year. We conducted 4 quarterly meetings, two prayer services, a service project and assisted with three Association events.

Gaye Coleman, career missionary, was the speaker for the Baptist Women's World Day of Prayer Milan FBC in November. Twenty- six women attended.

In January Michael Dennison, chaplain at Baptist Hospital in Union City, spoke to the leadership team about his role at the hospital which includes ministry and service to the staff as well as the patients. He challenged us to partner with Second Baptist Church, Union City in doing something for the nurses at the hospital during National Nurses Week. After consultation with the WMU Director at Second Baptist, we decided that the ladies in Gibson Baptist Association would honor the nurses at Milan Hospital and Second Baptist would honor the nurses at Baptist Hospital, Union City. We asked for 53 treat bags for the nurses at the Milan Hospital from the ladies in the WOM/WMU and received 176! Several women from various churches were able to bless staff at several nursing homes, doctor's offices, and clinics in addition to the hospital on National Nurses Day, May 12. For their contribution, Kenton FBC presented several baskets of treats to Baptist Hospital, Union City.

Our quarterly meetings averaged 27. We heard from speakers about missions work in Korea, China, North Korea, renovations at the Baptist Conference Centers, and relief work at the Ukrainian/Romanian border. Host churches were Bethel-Yorkville, Mt Pleasant, Rutherford FBC, and Whitehall. My thanks go to the women of these churches who hosted the meetings.

The WMU/WOM women also assisted with Association and county-wide events. They provided the food for the Sixth Annual Jerry Legg Volunteer Mission Banquet at Trenton FBC. Approximately 59 people attended. The WMU Leadership Team planned and conducted the National Day of Prayer observance in May at the Yorkville Community Center in conjunction with Bethel-Yorkville. Kenny Evans spoke to the approximately 50 attendees. In August the WMU assisted with the Missions rally that concluded the GBA's first Missions weekend.

In June, the WMU decorated the conference room and provided the refreshments for Bro Roger's farewell reception. He has been a strong supporter of WMU; we are sorry to see him leave the Association.

During 2022, the WMU Leadership Team began planning for a significant anniversary and will continue to do so in 2022-2023. GBA WMU ladies will be preparing for the 2024, 100th year anniversary of the GBA WMU. This is also the 100th year anniversary for the GBA. The WMU is publishing a 100-day remembrance/devotion guide in honor of the April 2024 anniversary which will be available in September 2023. We have already agreed that donations received for the guide will be used to purchase a brick on the national WMU Walk of Faith in Birmingham, AL and contribute toward the construction of Legacy Hall at Linden Valley Conference Center. Many ideas are in the talking stages, but the culminating event will be a tea at The Church at Sugar Creek (formerly named Humboldt FBC); they hosted the first WMU meeting in April of 1924. The theme of the tea is "Hats off to the next 100 years!"

The primary responsibility of the Seek Team is to create and promote evangelistic training and evangelistic opportunities for churches of the Gibson Baptist Association. Our biggest project this year was our involvement with the Gibson County fair. Again this year we provided a meal for the workers on Sunday evening. Understanding the language barrier we faced last year, we invited Jesús Gomez from Memphis, to come and share a message in Spanish. After the service we know of at least one gospel conversation that took place and a very special prayer request that we were able to follow up with throughout the week.

On Monday through Saturday nights we manned a prayer tent just inside the gates of the fairgrounds. I know of several Gospel conversations that took place, many were able to prayer walk during the fair, and there many requests for prayer. I want to share one of the prayer requests I received. On the first night of the prayer tent I was approached by a lady named Janet. She shared with me that her grandson, Levi, would be having an EEG that Wednesday. Levi was having seizures and they were trying to determine the cause of those seizures. I was able not only to pray with Janet but also share with her that my son also had a seizure disorder. In 2 Cor. 1:3-4 Paul speaks of how God will comfort us in our times of tribulation so that we in turn can offer comfort to others. It was a blessing for me to share with this grandmother during a time of uncertainty that God has a greater plan. We struggled when Kamrin was first diagnosed with his seizure disorder, but God comforted us, and I was able to share with this grandmother that God would also comfort her. God will use us in ways we could never imagine if we will just make ourselves available.

We have a good relationship with the fair committee and look forward to many years serving in this capacity. I want to personally thank everyone that gave of their time to serve this year.

Our Twice Blessed thrift store continues to be busy with lots of donations and good sales which help to support the community through food assistance and household and clothing assistance as well as our transition home. At Twice Blessed we also screen applicants for utility assistance for our Ministerial Alliance and hold Powered for Life classes supplemented by classes from the UT Ext. office for 16 weeks twice per year. We hold these classes each year simultaneously at the Gibson County Correctional Facility.

The blessings have continued to come as we have seen several at the jail accept Christ as their Savior. We have added new members to our board. Since our last report, we have had two successful fundraisers. We awarded our "Joyce Brown" Volunteer of the year to Margie Wollam in December. We were recognized for the second year in a row as "Best of the Best" Charity/Non-Profit. We were nominated by the Chamber for best business of the year. We experienced a record sales month in November 2021.

Our House of Hope continues to thrive as we have had 11 different women admitted since August 1st of 2021. A few have stayed with us long term and others have left prematurely. We can only hope that we have touched all of them for Christ. We currently have 3 ladies plus our House Manager at the house. The girls attend Celebrate Recovery classes weekly, participate in community projects and work at the thrift store.

The blessings have come to the girls at the house in many ways this past year also. The churches, WMU groups, civic organizations and individuals have provided them with food and hygiene products. They have been the recipient of a team who painted the house and manicured the bushes and trees. The First Presbyterian Church of Trenton donated a van for transporting the women.

Sunday School Report

For the last several years, the Annual Church Profiles show Sunday School attendance and enrollment decreasing. The annual church profiles for 2021/22 show that Sunday School enrollment decreased again. Our churches reported a Sunday School enrollment of 4,417 which is a decrease of 310 from last year's enrollment of 4,727. However, our Sunday School average attendance increased by 262 people with the 2020/21 average attendance at 2,458 and the 2021/22 average attendance at 2,720.

Youth Team Report

The Youth Team sponsored two events this year.

The first event was the "Student Night at the Fair" which took place at the Gibson County Fair's Main Stage. The event was well attended and at least three decisions were made by young people to follow Christ among other decisions. The event used local speakers and music leaders (Johnny McCartney from Mt Pleasant Baptist Church spoke and Matt Dunagan from Sugar Creek Baptist Church led worship) so the extra budgeted funds for leader travel did not need to be used. At the event the sound system had issues due to its required wifi connectivity, so the decision was made to add funds to the budget for next year to rent a sound system.

The second event was a Student leader fellowship. Ten leaders (five couples) were able to attend the event which was hosted at Salem Baptist Church. We budgeted for three to five fellowships but took too long to get the fellowship organized and communicated to allow multiple fellowships in the 2021-2022 budget calendar. The next fellowship should be easier to organize now that momentum has begun and is planned for January of 2023. Student Leaders from New Bethlehem Baptist Church have offered to host the next fellowship.

TENNESSEE BAPTIST MISSION BOARD REPORTS

Baptist Memorial Health Care System

Baptist Memorial Health Care began as a 150-bed hospital in downtown Memphis in 1912. It was formed by the Southern Baptist Conventions of Tennessee, Mississippi, and Arkansas because they recognized a tremendous need for a health care facility in this part of the country. The hospital's early days were rough – at one point, it almost closed – but eventually it grew to become the largest private hospital in the world. The hospital played a very important role in the history of health care in the 20th century, celebrating many firsts along the way.

The Baptist Memorial Health Care system was created in 1981 to provide an integrated health care delivery system offering a full continuum of care to communities throughout the Mid-South. Today, a total of 22 hospitals in Arkansas, Tennessee, and Mississippi; an 800-member physician group; and dozens of other entities are affiliated with Baptist.

Baptist Memorial Health Care's staff chaplains are a part of the health care team. Patients, family members or employees know that they can ask for a chaplain at any time to augment our health care with spiritual or emotional care. In our hospitals, our chaplains represent their own faith but often deal with spiritual issues that transcend denominational lines.

In August 2017, Baptist's Pastoral Care Department introduced the Rev. Jimmy Terry Preaching Series. The series is named in memory of a beloved member of Baptist's Board of Trustees and the founder and former pastor of Tabernacle Baptist Church in Clarksville, Tennessee. Each month, a speaker – usually an ordained Baptist minister – delivers an evangelical message to employees, physicians, patients and visitors at Baptist's flagship hospital. The message is also broadcast to all 22 of Baptist's hospitals in Tennessee, Mississippi and Arkansas, and it is promoted on Baptist's Facebook page. During the past year, these Facebook posts reached 50,000 people, and the videos were viewed 49,000 times.

This fall, Baptist will open West Tennessee's first freestanding emergency department in Arlington, Tennessee, providing exceptional emergency services to an under-served area. The \$16 million state-of-the-art emergency department measures 35,000 square feet and includes eight patient rooms, CT scan, X-ray and ultrasound imaging technology. A Baptist Medical Group primary care office and a helipad will be built next to the new facility.

Baptist donated the former McKenzie Regional Hospital building and grounds, valued at \$1.29 million, to the McKenzie Industrial Board. The property will help spearhead economic growth and development for the community. In 2018, Baptist purchased McKenzie Regional's buildings, land, equipment, and ambulance service from Quorum Health Corporation to preserve health care in the region. Baptist maintained outpatient services in McKenzie and expanded services at Baptist Carroll County in nearby Huntingdon, Tennessee.

U.S. News & World Report ranked Baptist Memphis No. 1 in the metro-Memphis area and No. 3 in Tennessee in its 2022-23 Best Hospitals rankings. For this year's rankings, U.S. News evaluated more than 4,500 hospitals across 15 specialties and 20 procedures and conditions. Baptist Memphis, along with Baptist Union City, earned several "High Performing" ratings.

Baptist & Reflector

The *Baptist and Reflector* continues to strive to produce articles and columns that impact Tennessee Baptist Convention churches. A major emphasis this year has been an emphasis on the Five Objectives and how are states are still dealing with COVID and how it has caused additional stress on pastors and our churches. The paper provided extensive coverage of the impact of the Supreme Court's reversal of *Roe v. Wade* and the Southern Baptist Convention's decision to adopt the Sexual Abuse Task Force. The *B&R* also has provided coverage of Tennessee Baptist's Sexual Abuse Task Force and will include coverage of their report during this year's Summit in Memphis.

The *B&R* is mailed to more than 16,000 homes 26 weeks a year, reaching nearly 40,000 readers.

In addition, the *B&R* website has grown steadily since it was introduced in late 2015. Numbers are incomplete for 2022 but in 2021, we sent our 47 E-newsletters reaching a potential audience of more than 20,000 people for each newsletter. During that year we had more than 400,000 pages views and nearly 200,000 site visitors.

The goal of the paper is to "tell the story of Tennessee Baptists" through news, feature stories and photographs. As in the past, the paper this year placed a major emphasis on what Tennessee Baptists are doing to reach the world for Christ by focusing on stories related to missions and evangelism. This year the paper has focused on timely topics such as domestic violence that impact Tennessee Baptists and our churches.

The *Baptist and Reflector* continued to utilize social media tools in 2022 such as Twitter. Editor Lonnie Wilkey regularly writes a blog that provides information for Tennessee Baptists between print issues.

The staff monitors trends that could affect Tennessee Baptists and prints those stories to keep readers informed. In addition, opinions, both from the editor and others, are printed and are intended to make readers think, reflect, and act.

The paper continually seeks to enlist new subscribers. We need more churches to send the paper to their leadership such as deacons, Sunday School teachers, etc. We are asking every reader of the *B&R* for the next year to consider sending one subscription to someone they know. If just a small percentage of our readers would do this, our print circulation would significantly increase. Associational Report 2022

Our partnership with Tennessee Baptists enables us to fulfill our mission as we serve our community, the marketplace, and the Church. Our distinctive Christ-centered approach to education is designed to equip students to leave C-N loving Jesus more and trusting the Scripture more.

This past year has included:

- The University completed our first year of a five-year strategic plan entitled *Acorns to Oaks: Pursuing God's Preferred Future*, marked by beginning construction of the Drama and Ted Russell Center, future home of C-N's nursing program.
- At the opening of the 2021-22 academic year, the University posted an enrollment of 2,835 students, the second highest in Carson-Newman's history.
- Carson-Newman was named a "Best Regional College" by Princeton Review. U.S. News & World Report ranked C-N's online graduate education program No. 2 in the state and No. 1 among Tennessee private institutions.
- The University's Board of Trustees approved the new College of Professional Studies which launched fall 2022. It's designed to serve adult and professional students with a distinctive Christ-centered approach to education across the southeast.
- C-N changed the name of its "School of Religion" to "School of Biblical and Theological Studies," as well as launched a Master of Divinity degree this fall.
- Thankfully we saw God work by continuing to draw students to saving faith in Jesus Christ last year. This gave us the opportunity to hold a baptismal service in Mossy Creek.
- C-N's Campus Ministries partnered with GenSend, a North American Mission Board initiative, and sent three mission teams to Denver, Pittsburgh, and New Orleans during Spring Break. During summer 2022, students continued to serve in Denver and Pittsburgh, as well as missions in Jamaica, Nicaragua, and the Dominican Republic.
- More than 500 C-N students, faculty and staff participated in the University's annual Day of Service, taking part in projects across Jefferson, Hamblen, Blount, Grainger, and Knox counties.
- For the academic year, C-N students spent 21,500 hours involved in community service and outreach.
- C-N began a Delight Ministry chapter on campus, a nationwide organization with Bible studies and discipleship groups for college women.
- University renamed its "Appalachian Outreach Ministries" to "Appalachian Ministries of the Smokies" (AMOS).
- Carson-Newman honored Long Hollow Church Senior Pastor Robby Gallaty with the inaugural Ken Sparks Award. The presentation took place during the 2021 TBC Summit in Brentwood.
- Carson-Newman's Christ-centered education was the focus of an episode of *The College Tour, Season 3*. The series and C-N's 30-minute episode are featured on Amazon Prime, Roku, Apple TV, and other platforms.
- Chapel services are on Tuesdays at 9:30 during the fall and spring semesters. We would love to encourage Tennessee Baptists to worship us when you can.

Harrison-Chilhowee Baptist Academy celebrates 143 years of Christ centered education in East Tennessee. For the past twenty-nine years, Tennessee Baptist's accredited Christian boarding and day school has operated as The King's Academy. Students from across the globe are The Academy's most distinctive feature, with over 1,100 students and 99 nations represented since 1935. The King's Academy is experiencing a 500% increase in the amount of new international boarding students during 2022-23 academic year while also experiencing a growth in the program as a whole after graduating over seventy percent of boarding students in the 2021-22 academic year. Students currently enrolled represent the following nations: Aruba, Brazil, China, Czech Republic, Croatia, Curaçao, Italy, Japan, Montenegro, and Rwanda.

The greatest news to report regarding The King's Academy from the previous academic year is that forty-three students accepted Jesus Christ as their Lord and Savior. Academy staff worked diligently to disciple and partner with local churches to ensure that students were plugged into the local body of Christ. The Spirit is at work on campus in Seymour, Tennessee, and we pray for further movement towards life change.

The Academy remains devoted to developing servant leaders that will change the world for Christ. Beginning in 2021, TKA launched its' "Love Where We Live" initiative that focuses on servant leadership opportunities for students in K3-12th grade. Academy students logged over 500 service hours as they served communities throughout East Tennessee. By serving others, students are learning the value of a mission minded lifestyle while also learning about the world that the Lord has created.

The King's Academy is honored to announce that at the start of the academic year, The Academy is experiencing continued enrollment growth for the second year in a row coming off the global pandemic. The Academy is set to begin the year with a 5% increase from the previous, and a total increase of 12% increase over the past two years. Leadership continues to focus on growing the international program, which was hit the hardest due to the pandemic, while being greatly encouraged by the local day student growth and reach into the local community.

The 2021-22 academic year also saw the largest increase in community support and giving, as leadership has worked diligently to make much needed capital improvements to the aging campus infrastructure. Along with the Board of Trustees, campus leadership is working to develop long term plans to accommodate current and anticipated growth in the near future.

- The LifeShape Scholarship is a major gift to Union that will help recruit some of the brightest students in the humanities and social sciences.
- In September, we will break ground on a new academic building that will house the McAfee School of Business in addition to our engineering and computer science departments.

We are so grateful for our Tennessee Baptist friends and their encouragement to us in our work. We ask for your continued prayers as we seek to provide students with an excellent, Christ-centered education.

The Lord has been kind and faithful to Union for two centuries. His providence has strengthened us and sustained us, and His care will continue to guide us as we embark upon our third century as an institution.

Tennessee Baptist Adult Homes, Inc. Report to Associations, 2022

I am happy to report that we have had only a few infections of Covid-19 in our homes. That is because of the faithful men and women who serve as direct care providers in our six group homes. As always, I remain grateful and appreciative for their diligence and vigilance as they joyfully *"Show What Love Is."* As of this date (July 21, 2022), Tennessee has the fifth lowest rate of vaccination, has a 25% infection rate, has a death rate from Covid that is double the national rate and we are again considered "high risk." So, we will remain vigilant as we continue to ride the roller coaster that is Covid-19.

The SOAR fund (Supplying Ongoing Aid to Residents) that was established through the Tennessee Baptist Foundation in 2019 has suffered losses, just as everyone who has investments anywhere. It is our hope and prayer that we will not need to invade the SOAR fund as we continue our development of Baptist Village Humboldt. Baptist Village Humboldt is well underway, and we are getting excited about opening our first two buildings in the coming months. When completed, Baptist Village Humboldt will have 10 duplex buildings (a total of 20 units) for financially needy seniors. We will give priority of placement in these units to retired Baptist pastors and missionaries.

We have had to cancel Special Friends Camp now for three years in a row due to our inability to find Counselors. Evidently, most camps everywhere are having the same difficulty in finding young people for staff. Due to these losses, TBAH has determined that we will not seek to have Special Friends Camp for the foreseeable future and possibly ever again.

Our Father's Day Offering receipts are pretty much on target to come in at a rate consistent with previous years. As always, we are hopeful that we will exceed our goal and avoid using any further reserves, thus allowing us to fund deferred maintenance projects at our locations.

2022 Annual Report to Associations

Since 1938 the Tennessee Baptist Foundation has been of service to Tennessee Baptists and Kingdom causes around the world. The assets under management of the Foundation have grown from \$6,577 to \$162 million during that time. God continues to bless this ministry and we are pleased to make our report to the associations as to highlights for the fiscal year 2021-22 thus far. The Foundation is pleased to offer the following services to Tennessee Baptists:

- ◆ Presenting informational Faith-based estate planning seminars for churches
- ◆ Working with individuals, helping them develop distinctively Christian personal estate plans
- ◆ Assisting individuals in their establishment of various Charitable Trusts
- ◆ Serving as Trustee of trusts and funds committed to its care
- ◆ Providing investment services to Tennessee Baptist churches, associations and institutions
- ◆ Helping churches establish Legacy Ministries
- ◆ Facilitating loans to Tennessee Baptist churches/associations
- ◆ Providing grants for qualifying new ministries and projects

Highlights of the Foundation's stewardship thus far for this fiscal year include:

- ✓ Funds under management: Over 1,100
- ✓ Assets under management: \$162,355,269 (as of June 30, 2022)
- ✓ New fund additions as of June 30, 2022: \$1,706,781 (15 new funds)
- ✓ Educational scholarships: 176 - totaling \$149,000 for 2022-2023 academic year. (Awarded over \$6.1 million in scholarships since 1987)
- ✓ Special Project Grants: As of June 30, 2022, we have distributed \$62,700 to assist 9 ministry projects.
- ✓ Cooperative Program: \$332,675 as of June 30, 2022. Projected to give over \$600,000 by year end.

2022 Annual Report

In 2021-22, Tennessee WMU challenged Tennessee Baptists to be relentless in living authentic faith in Christ, seeking God in prayer, giving sacrificially, and witnessing to others. This report shares information about some of the state events, ministries, and initiatives that have taken place.

Tennessee WMU launched the Tennessee Youth Venture Team in the fall of 2021 to replace the former State Acteens Advisory Panel. The high school students chosen to serve each year are challenged, disciplined, and mentored in a missions lifestyle. The students on the 2021-22 Venture Team were Noah Crook, Grayce McEarl, Pierce McNew, Haylin Ownby, and Avery Pace.

Over 350 boys, leaders, and personnel attended the 2021 RA Camp-O-Ree at Linden Valley Baptist Conference Center on October 15-17. This missions camping event for boys grades 1-12 is hosted by Mid-South Royal Ambassadors and Tennessee WMU.

Tennessee WMU produced a missions event kit for children in grades 1-6 with an 80's theme feel, "Jammin' in a Box." The event kit included a Bible lesson, missions lesson, and suggestions for crafts, games, and mission projects. Seventy-five event kits were purchased by or given to churches across the state to utilize.

2022 Missions Get-Together was held at the Gatlinburg Convention Center on April 1-3, with a total attendance of 773 people representing over 175 churches. Through the event ministry project, participants brought more than 15,000 items and \$2,660 in gift cards and cash that will be used to minister to refugee families across the state and international students working in the Gatlinburg/Pigeon Forge resort ministries area

The 2022 Tennessee WMU Annual Meeting occurred on April 2 during the Saturday morning general session of Missions Get-Together in Gatlinburg. The meeting included highlights of the work of Tennessee WMU and the election of 2022-23 state officers and new Executive Board members.

In April 2022, \$39,700 in scholarships were awarded by the Tennessee WMU Executive Board to 43 students attending graduate school, seminary, and undergraduate schools in Tennessee during the 2022-23 school year. These scholarships are funded through endowments, invested funds, and the Golden Offering for Tennessee Missions.

Christian Women's Job Corps and Christian Men's Job Corps are ministries of WMU that seek to help men and women break the cycle of poverty through job and life skill classes, Bible study, and mentoring. We currently have 20 sites (14 CWJC and 6 CMJC) in 13 locations across the state. Begin Anew of Middle TN celebrated 25 years of ministry in 2022 as it was the first CWJC site started in Tennessee.

The 2021-22 Tennessee Missions Emphasis theme was "Same Jesus. Sharing Hope and Truth." The 2021-22 Golden Offering for Tennessee Missions goal was \$2,100,000, and the total amount given as of July 21, 2022, was \$2,124,958. Besides this year's offering being the highest amount given in the 120-year history of the Golden Offering, it is also the first time since 2007-08 that Tennessee Baptists have reached the goal for the Golden Offering.

For we are laborers together with God, encouraging and equipping churches and individuals to engage in missions learning and involvement that enables them to fulfill the Great Commission.

2022 NAMB SBC Ministry Report

At NAMB, it's all about the gospel. The reason we do everything we do is to help Southern Baptists make disciples in North America and beyond. We do that through three primary ministry areas: Send Network, Send Relief and Evangelism.

But before I outline some highlights from those three areas, I want to thank Southern Baptists on behalf of all our missionaries for how you gave to North American missions in 2021. Thanks to your commitment and generosity, the Annie Armstrong Easter Offering reached another all-time record high, coming in at \$66.5 million. You can only imagine just how encouraging this has been to our missionaries during times of such turmoil and uncertainty in our world. While we do not put our faith in money, this offering is a very tangible demonstration of God's faithfulness and provision. It also shows the generosity and commitment Southern Baptists have toward missions. So, thank you again and please know that every dollar of this offering is spent on the field and with the utmost care.

Send Network. We partner with Southern Baptists to help plant churches everywhere for everyone in North America through Send Network. In 2021, we celebrated the 588 new churches Southern Baptists started in 2020 (previous year counts are released in the second quarter of each year). Incredibly, that's an increase of 36 over the previous year. We are so grateful for how God worked and for the perseverance of our church planters. The mission is moving forward! Please join us in praying that God would raise up more church planters. Currently, the biggest barrier that keeps us from planting more churches is the lack of qualified planter candidates.

Send Relief. Our partnership with the International Mission Board through Send Relief has been an incredible blessing. Now Southern Baptists have a single, central place to go where they can serve on mission to carry out compassion ministry in North America or around the globe. And this ministry is growing. We now have 17 Send Relief Ministry Centers in North America with more coming in 2022. Not only do these centers give mission teams a place to serve, they also provide models for churches that want to start similar ministries in their own communities. Our dream is to see hundreds of such church-based ministry centers in the years ahead. All of it is focused on meeting needs while sharing Christ.

Our Send Relief Serve Tour launched in 2021 with an event in Tulsa, Oklahoma. It was an incredible blessing to the community and an opportunity for local churches and volunteers to share Christ as they worked on homes and served their neighbors in multiple ways. More Serve Tour events are coming in 2022 as we partner with state conventions, local associations and churches.

Evangelism and Leadership. Many pastors are hurting. Pastor care is more important than ever. Because of this, we increased the number of our Timothy+Barnabas events this past year. We will do the same in 2022 so we can help bring healing and encouragement to many more pastors in need.

There were so many other things to celebrate, but as I conclude, I want to remind you that NAMB is here to serve. Pastors are our number one customer.

At NAMB, it really is all about the Gospel, and we are all about doing whatever it takes to help your church fulfill its Great Commission goals.

Thank you again for how you support our nearly 6,000 missionaries and chaplains, and thank you for your partnership in the Gospel.

The Lord blessed His people with a vision of His throne in heaven, and that vision is IMB's vision: A multitude from every nation, tribe, people and language knowing and worshiping our Lord Jesus Christ (Rev. 7:9-10). He has given us a foretaste of His victory through this vision! We find hope in this vision. We find purpose in this vision.

And we praise the Lord for allowing us to work in His task, telling all we can reach with the good news of His great redeeming love. As it is written in Isaiah 52:7, "How beautiful are the feet of those who preach the good news!"

For 176 years, Southern Baptists have sent missionaries to proclaim the gospel of hope among the nations through the International Mission Board. In fact, IMB's very mission is to serve Southern Baptists in carrying out the Great Commission to make disciples of all nations.

Together, we get to be part of the most important work in the entire universe.

While Southern Baptists work in nearly every country of the world, the IMB prioritizes getting the gospel to those who have yet to hear. Some have claimed that only 3% of all missionaries and 1% of all mission dollars are used among the unreached. That can never be said of IMB missionaries. Nor can that be said of Southern Baptists' generous gifts through the Cooperative Program and the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering®. I'm pleased to report that 91% of IMB missionary teams are engaging unreached people groups, and the overwhelming majority of IMB financial resources are spent among the unreached.

That is especially important right now with our world in the shape it's in. These have been difficult days. With deaths related to COVID-19 continuing to mount across the U.S. and around the world, and with death and the fear of death paralyzing people worldwide, the good news of the gospel is the world's greatest need.

Getting the good news to those places where it hasn't been heard is difficult during a pandemic. Churches across the convention who typically engage in short-term global mission trips were grounded for more than a year. Yet, with literally tens of thousands of Southern Baptists who would have been sharing the gospel overseas on these trips unable to go, our witness among the nations has not been silenced because your full-time overseas IMB missionaries continue their work.

In the midst of this global pandemic, we've continually heard good-news reports from all around the globe. Last year, IMB personnel reported more than 144,000 people coming to faith in Jesus Christ and nearly 87,000 following the Lord in baptism. More than 18,000 new churches were planted, and nearly 21,000 pastors received sound theological training.

This work could continue in a locked-down world because Southern Baptist missionaries have invested their lives full-time on the mission field — which is only possible because of your faithful support through both CP and the LMCO. We hit an exciting milestone in 2021 as Southern Baptists gave a cumulative \$5 billion to Lottie Moon since the offering began in 1888; and last year, you exceeded the goal with your gifts of \$177.6 million in the 2020-21 offering campaign. You also faithfully give through the Cooperative Program, which is necessary to both fund field work and undergird our vital support systems, with \$96.8 million in CP gifts in 2020-21. I want to sincerely thank you for giving and holding firm on the financial lifeline for Southern Baptist international missions.

We are driven by the urgency that much remains to be accomplished until together, under the power of Christ, we can continue to welcome the multitudes before His throne. Because of that urgency, I also want to honestly tell you: We need you to continue to give, and if more people are going to hear the gospel, we need to increase our collective gifts so we can send more missionaries to the lost.

And because we still have work to do, we have a target to increase the number of frontline missionaries by 500 over the next five years. To make that happen, we need to get the word out. We need to call out the called and encourage every pastor and preacher across the Southern Baptist Convention to call out the called.

The need has never been greater. Now is the time to send more of those beautiful feet spreading good news. The nations are waiting — we must go!
