Bro. Eric Ryne McLemore

April 18, 1988 – February 17, 2023



Eric was born on April 18, 1988 in Jackson to Joe and Donna Gail Kee McLemore. Bro. Eric attended Liberty High School in Jackson, answered the Lords call to preach the Word, and upon graduation continued his education at Union University in Jackson. In between high school graduation and attending Union University, he attended Bethel University in McKenzie and played baseball for the Wildcats. Eric was the pastor of the Northside Baptist Church in Milan for the past six years.

He wore many hats serving his Milan community. Bro. Eric was the president of the Milan Ministerial Association, worked as a funeral assistant with Bodkin Funeral Home and helped the Bradford High School Baseball team as an assistant coach. However, two things were apparent in his life. His love for his wife and three children and his love for his church and the calling God had placed on his life.

Garry was born March 8, 1961, in Mt. Clemens, MI, to Eugene Anthony Burkacki and Beverly Jean (Higgins) Burkacki. He grew up in Richmond, Michigan and graduated from Richmond High School in 1980. Growing up Garry was very involved in Sunday School, RA's, youth and missions in his home church, First Baptist New Baltimore, MI. Garry felt God's calling to preach and pastor early in his teens and preached his first sermon at 17 years old, at his home church in New Baltimore, MI. After graduating high school, he moved to Humboldt, TN to further his education at Union University.

Over the 45 years of his ministry, he served 9 churches in Michigan, Tennessee, and Mississippi. He was pastoring Bethpage Baptist Church in Kenton, TN when the Lord called him home.

Minutes

Gibson Baptist Association Annual Meeting
First Baptist Church – Medina, Tennessee – October 23, 2023

1. Video – We watched the video from the Tennessee Baptist Children’s Home as people were coming into the sanctuary.
2. Call to Order – The meeting was called to order by James Rogers, moderator, pastor at Oakwood in Milan. Seventy-nine (79) messengers were present representing twenty-eight (28) churches.
3. Welcome & Prayer – Randy Pool, pastor at FBC Medina, welcomed everyone and led the opening prayer. James Rogers, moderator, read the adoption of program and seating of messengers.
4. Video & TMB Representative – We watched a video of Dr. Davis welcoming everyone to the annual meeting. Morgan Owen, UTM BCM Director, gave the association a thank you plaque for the 32 churches who gave \$46,000 plus to the Golden Offering with about \$7,000 coming back to Gibson County.
5. Congregational Song – Adam Stanford, minister of music at FBC Medina, led the congregation in the song “Because He Lives.”
6. Financial Report – Jim Acree, treasurer, member FBC Dyer, gave the report. He said we took in \$75 over budget for the year. We are transferring \$32,576.79 to the contingency fund due to the general fund balance of over \$50,000. The financial report was approved as read.
7. Budget Committee Report – Joey Hayes, member of the budget committee, member New Hope Dyer, gave the report. The budget for 2023-2024 is \$204,772.00. The budget was approved as read.
8. Nomination Committee Report – Sherry Scruggs, member of the nomination committee, gave the report. The report was approved as written. GBA officers for the new year are Moderator - Johnny McCartney, Assistant Moderator - Randy Pool, Clerk - Leann Cherry, Treasurer - Jim Acree, and Assistant Treasurer- Joel Pigg.
9. Send Team Recommendation – Joey Hufstedler, TL, pastor New Hope, said the goal for the Wingo Offering was set at \$20,000. Disbursement is 70% International Missions, 25 % North American Missions and 5% Disaster Relief. The recommendation was approved as printed.
10. Miscellaneous Business – None
11. WMU Report – Sheilah Spangler, WMU Director, member Salem, encouraged churches to have age-appropriate mission groups. She also talked about the celebration next year of 100 years of WMU and the devotionals that are being printed.
12. Memorials – A video listing all those who died in the association in the past year was shown.
13. Congregational Song – Adam Stanford, music minister FBC Medina, led the congregation in the hymn “Great is Thy Faithfulness.”

Executive Board Report

The Executive Board of the Association has as its purpose to conduct the business of the association between annual meetings. The Board is composed of one elected representative from each church and the pastor of the church. The Constitution and Bylaws require the Board to meet quarterly.

January 2023 highlights:

Moderator James Rogers recognized new pastor of Idlewild Baptist Church, Brother Robert Talbott. Jim Acree reported that “our expenditures were less than what we took in.” Mike Kemper reported that there were 12 churches seeking a pastor. Sheila Spangler reported about the Volunteer Banquet held at Salem Baptist Church on February 9 and that the WMU was collecting memories for the devotional book to be printed related to 100th year celebration of our WMU. A strategy plan was presented and approved for Hispanic Church Plants. John Coleman, member of the DOM Search Team, reported that “they had narrowed the search to 1, but he decided to stay where he was”.

February 28 Special Called Meeting highlights:

Moderator James Rogers called the special meeting held at the White Hall Baptist Church to order. Motion was made by the DOM Search Team to hire Bro. Mike Kemper as Director of Missions. The ballot vote was unanimous to approve the motion.

April 24 highlights:

Jim Acree, treasurer reported “we continue to be doing well, spending less than we take in, but we are still behind the budgeted amount.” Mike Kemper announced that previous attempts to initiate Hispanic Church plants had failed to materialize but that we continue to seek the Lord’s direction in that need. Kemper also mentioned plans to re-equip the Disaster Trailer not only with chain saw equipment, but also utility tools and equipment which would allow churches to utilize the trailer and equipment for either disaster or ministry projects. John Coleman, member of the Send Team, recommended changes to the International and North America Mission Projects section of the Wingo Guidelines. The motions passed unanimously.

July 24 highlights:

Jim Acree, treasurer, reported that finances continue to run a bit behind budget but that we have spent less in general than budgeted. Mike Kemper talked about the need for pastors in 16 of our churches. Sheila Spangler spoke about the National Day of Prayer and about on-going projects such as Isaiah 117. Christy Skelton talked about the need for more volunteers at the Twice Blessed Thrift Store in Trenton. Jim Acree made a motion to have the tree that was down on our property removed at a cost of \$1,100. Motion passed.

Association Missions Strategist (AMS) Report

What a tremendous blessing for me to be back in the Gibson Baptist Association again! Though the Lord has given Kathy and I several different assignments which have been very fulfilling, none more than this association of churches and people! As we assess and get ready to celebrate 100 years of Kingdom service it is amazing and humbling to see what God has done among Gibson Baptist churches and people! In preparing this report I began to be curious about the number of baptisms our churches have recorded over these past 99 years! So, I dug through the mountain of GBA Annual Minute Books and tallied it up. I didn't find a baptism number for 1924 and couldn't find a Minute Book for 1938, but from all the other reports, including this year, for 99 years we have had 36,681 baptisms which is an average of 370 per year! Praise the Lord for the increase this year over last year and the most since 2017!

I am so thankful for every GBA church and every church member! Praise the Lord for all those who serve as Pastor, Staff, Deacon, Teacher, Officer, Auxiliary, Missionary, Volunteer! Praise the Lord for every Christian witness and example! Our churches and people in every area of our county are salt and light, like Kingdom Outposts amid lostness and darkness. Day by day, week by week, month by month, year by year, living, working, serving, doing, giving, going, carrying the Gospel to our neighborhood, community, county, across the state, and around the world! Gibson Baptists are on mission with the King's Business!

As we seek the Lord's directives we praise the Lord for outreach ministries that help us show the love, power, and the redemption of our Lord Jesus through Birth Choice; Twice Blessed Thrift Store, Hope House; and we rejoice that we are also now partnering with CEF (Child Evangelism Fellowship); Isaiah 117 (children's transition to Foster Care); FCA (Fellowship of Christian Athletes); "Why Not" community kitchen; and community food closet in Trenton (FBC). Also, many of our churches are connected and working in various other ministries across our county! Let us continue to pray, contribute, and volunteer in these life changing Kingdom opportunities! And yet, there is obvious need to continue to reach farther into lostness with possibility of establishing Christian Men's Job Corp; Addiction Recovery; and Hispanic ministry in our county. For several years now we have sought a path forward reach into these strata of our population. 2023-2024 GUIDELINES FOR WINGO MISSION FUNDS

To receive Wingo Funds for any mission trip or project, all volunteers must undergo a background check with the GBA. This requirement follows the mission sending agencies of the Southern Baptist Convention and is for the legal prudence of the GBA. No funds will be dispersed for any trip or project until the background screening requirements are complete, and payment has been received.

BACKGROUND SCREENING REQUIREMENTS

- 1) Volunteers must submit three references using the reference forms provided by the GBA. The references must be from individuals who are not family members of the volunteers and must be at least 21 years of age. One of the three references must be from the pastor of the church where the volunteer is a member. In cases where the church is without a pastor, a staff member or chairman of deacons may serve as a reference.
- 2) Volunteers must complete a personal interview questionnaire form provided by the GBA.
- 3) Volunteers under the age 18 are only required to submit reference forms and the personal interview questionnaire.
- 4) Volunteers who are older than 18 must have a background check through the company used by the GBA. A consent form will be provided for the volunteer to grant permission for the background check.
- 5) The volunteer will be responsible for paying the fee for the background check.
- 6) Volunteers are required to watch a child protection video provided by the GBA.
- 7) Volunteers are required to undergo background screening every four years with the GBA.
- 8) Churches participating in a mission trip other than a GBA led trip, shall conduct the background screening as outlined above. All background screening forms shall be maintained on file with the church. GBA will make available online background checks for churches. When a church has completed the background screening, an authorized representative of the church must sign a declaration statement provided by GBA, verifying that the background screening has been completed for every mission volunteer receiving Wingo Funds. Background screenings are valid for four years. In cases where a church receives a Church Scholarship (Multiple Scholarship), the same procedures must be followed along with a signed declaration statement to the GBA. Wingo funds will not be granted until such procedures are completed.

INTERNATIONAL MISSIONS PROJECTS

Gibson Baptist Association (GBA) Volunteers and churches participating in international mission projects are eligible for financial assistance from the Wingo International Fund account. Scholarships from this account primarily seek to encourage and help GBA Churches and Volunteers (ages 15 and older or a student who has completed 9th grade) to participate in mission projects. The following guidelines apply:

- A. **Individual:** Funds are available to assist GBA "lay" persons who participate in their very first international project/trip. First time mission volunteers are eligible for a scholarship of up to \$600. GBA "lay" persons who participate in subsequent international projects/trips are eligible for a scholarship of up to \$500. (once per calendar year).
- B. **GBA Church Scholarship:** If a GBA Church coordinates and plans in consultation with GBA on an international mission project, that church is eligible for Church scholarship up to \$4,000 maximum. (Individual scholarships would not apply, however, the church must utilize stated formulas per volunteer, once per calendar year, GBA Volunteer requirements apply). Example: A church taking 4 lay people and a senior pastor on a subsequent mission project would receive up to \$2,800.
- C. **GBA Multiple Church:** Multiple GBA Churches which coordinate and plan together in consultation with GBA, are eligible for scholarship up to \$5,000 maximum. (Individual scholarships would not apply, however, they must utilize the stated formulas per volunteer, once per calendar year, and GBA Volunteer requirements apply).
- D. **Senior Pastor:** A GBA Senior Pastor who has never participated in an International Mission Project/trip is eligible for a scholarship up to \$1,200. A "first time" Senior Pastor Scholarship does not impact scholarship maximum amounts stated above. Subsequent international project/trip for Senior Pastor are eligible for scholarship of up to \$800. (once per calendar year and is included in maximum scholarship amounts stated above).
- E. **Ministerial Staff:** GBA Ministerial Staff (other than the Senior Pastor), who has never participated in a International Project/trip is eligible for scholarship up to \$800. A "first time" Ministerial Staff scholarship does not impact scholarship amounts listed above. Subsequent international project/trip are eligible for scholarship up to \$600 (once per calendar year and is included in maximum amounts stated above).
- F. Individuals and Churches requesting Wingo Funds must complete an application which is available from the GBA office, in a timely fashion.

- G. Special requests not addressed in these guidelines may be submitted to the Send Team for consideration.
- H. GBA churches are also encouraged to support their members financially as they feel led to participate in International Mission Projects.

DISASTER RELIEF PROJECTS

- A. International disaster relief projects will qualify for travel assistance for GBA volunteers as listed above. However, for International Disaster Relief Projects, the minimum amount from this fund shall be \$500 for any volunteer from GBA, regardless of the number of trips/projects the volunteer may have participated in.
- B. Matching funds from the local church is encouraged.
- C. The maximum total contribution to volunteers from a single church for any specific project/trip travel assistance is \$2,000.
- D. USA disaster relief projects qualify for gasoline reimbursement for volunteers from GBA going to a disaster point as called upon by the GBA or TBC.
- E. An allocation of up to \$1,000 may be given to any area where a disaster has occurred. The gift and amount is to be determined by the Send Team of the association.

NORTH AMERICAN MISSIONS PROJECTS

Gibson Baptist Association (GBA) Volunteers and churches participating in North America Mission Projects/trips are eligible for financial assistance from the Wingo North American Fund account. Scholarships from this account primarily seek to encourage and help GBA churches and Volunteers (ages 13 and older or a student who has completed 7th grade) to participate in mission projects which require travel away from home/overnight. The following guidelines apply:

- A. **Individual:** Funds are available to assist “first time” North America volunteers (senior pastor, ministerial staff, or lay people). A scholarship of up to \$250 is available. In addition, if air travel is required up to \$250 is also available. Funds are available for volunteers who participate in subsequent North America projects/trips. These volunteers are eligible for up to \$200. scholarship. In addition, if air travel is required, up to \$200. is also available. The amount available is once per calendar year, per individual volunteer, GBA requirements apply.
- B. **A GBA Church** which plans & coordinates in consultation with GBA for a North American Mission project, is eligible for scholarship up to \$2,000. (Utilizing stated formulas per volunteer, which is the maximum amount available for North America Project, per church, once per calendar year, GBA requirements apply, individual scholarships would not apply).
- C. **GBA Multiple Church:** Multiple GBA churches who plan together on a North America Mission project, in consultation with GBA, are eligible for scholarship up to \$2,500. (Utilizing the stated formulas per volunteer, which is the maximum amount available for a North America Project, per church, once per calendar year, GBA requirements apply, individual scholarships would not apply).
- D. Individuals and Churches requesting Wingo Funds must complete an application which is available from the GBA office, in a timely fashion.
- E. Special requests not addressed in these guidelines may be submitted to the Send Team for consideration.
- F. GBA churches are also encouraged to support their members financially as they feel led to participate in North American mission projects.

WINGO OFFERING

Each year the Send Team of the association will recommend a goal for the Wingo Offering at the Annual Meeting of the GBA. Gifts from churches or individuals for these accounts are welcomed anytime during the budget year. However, a recommended date for receiving the Wingo Offering in the churches is the last Sunday of each month, May through September each year. Fund allocations from donations/offering will be determined by the Send Team each year. The Wingo Offering is named in honor of Rev. Charles Wingo, first Director of Missions, GBA. Wingo Funds exist to encourage volunteers and church participation.

SEND TEAM

The Send Team makes the following recommendations:

1. The SEND Team recommends that the Wingo Offering goal for 2023/2024 be \$20,000.
2. The SEND Team recommends that the Wingo Offering allocations be: 70% international, 25% North American, and 5% disaster relief.

SEND Team Report

The SEND team got a great deal of work done this past year. We had another great volunteer mission's banquet in February. We honored Mrs. Judy Cantrell for her dedicated mission service over the years. We are so grateful for her commitment and sacrifice.

We also planned and coordinated our 2nd annual GBA Mission's Day and rally. We encouraged every church to take part in a mission's activity in their local context. Wingo Fund Report

The Associational WMU has had a very good year. We conducted 4 quarterly meetings, two prayer services, and assisted with three Association events.

Pastor Matthew Nance, retired IMB missionary, was the speaker for the Baptist Women's World Day of Prayer at Emmanuel, Humboldt in November. 39 women attended.

Our quarterly meetings averaged 35. We heard from speakers about SEND Relief in the Ukraine (Sep 2022), World Crafts, "Fightin for Joy in Ministry", Isaiah 117 house and "Compassionaries" (Sep 2023). Approximately 59 people attended. The WMU Leadership Team planned and conducted the National Day of Prayer observance, a county wide event in May at the Trenton Agri-plex. Trenton mayor Tony Burriss spoke to the approximately 40 attendees. In August the WMU women prepared the food for the Missions rally that concluded the GBA's first Missions weekend.

During 2023, the WMU Leadership Team continued planning for the 100-year anniversary of GBA WMU which will be held at Sugar Creek April 20, 2024. The WMU is publishing a 100-day remembrance/devotion guide in honor of the April 2024 anniversary which will be available at the 2024 anniversary celebration at Sugar Creek. Sugar Creek, formerly Humboldt FBC, hosted the first GBA meeting in January of 1924.

In 2024 I'll be asking the WMU Leadership Team to consider what WMU should look like in the future. Times have changed and so must WMU in Gibson Baptist Association.

Christian Women's Job Corps Report

We have survived and thrived another year for the benefit of women in the ministry of Gibson County CWJC. Twice Blessed has exploded with an abundance of donations, and our House of Hope is currently running smoothly with our new house manager and 2 residents. At Twice Blessed, we processed 45 applications for utility assistance through the ministerial alliance and 58 applications for clothing and food assistance. It has been 20 years ago since our first site coordinators were certified, and God continues to bless and use us for His glory.

Some accomplishments this year include: Two 15 week Powered for Life classes completed in the Spring and the Fall both at Twice Blessed and at the Gibson County Correctional Facility; this included 9 total graduates, customer appreciation day with hotdogs and drinks, 2 attendees for WMU Get-Together in Brentwood, Brenda Taylor recognized as our "Joyce Brown Volunteer of the Year", debit/credit machine installed at Twice Blessed, a large new sign on the awning of Twice Blessed and another successful fundraiser.

We are overjoyed when the ladies at our House of Hope get saved and rededicate their lives. We have had 7 women come to the house and spend some time during the past year, and 5 have either gotten saved and baptized or rededicated their lives. We graduated one in January, and plan to graduate another this November. They graduate after finding a job, getting licenses reinstated, paying fines, and obtaining dependable transportation and a safe place to live.

We are grateful to all of the churches, organizations and individuals who continue to show their support of the ministry. We received two allotments from the GOTM, monetary support from our churches and individuals, gifts of supplies for the house, gifts of labor to provide lunches for the volunteers, repairs and upkeep of our home and volunteers who give of their time throughout the year at the store and in our classes. Our need for volunteers continues to be great, but we trust God to send the help. Thank you for your consideration of investing in the Gibson County Christian Women's Job Corp.

Sunday School Report

For the last several years, the Annual Church Profiles show Sunday School attendance and enrollment decreasing. The annual church profiles for 2022/23 show that Sunday School enrollment showed a slight decrease again. Youth Team Report

The first event was the "Student Night at the Fair" which took place at the Gibson County Fair's Main Stage. The event was well attended however, we did not receive any reports from churches about decisions made. The event used local speakers and music leaders (Joey Hufstedler from New Hope Baptist Church spoke and Matt Dunagan from Sugar Creek Baptist Church led worship). The extra budgeted funds for this event were used to purchase part of a sound system to be used for Student Night at the Fair this year, future years at the fair, and is available from the GBA office to churches to use other times as needed.

The second event was a Student Leader fellowship. Multiple leaders were able to attend several events hosted by leaders from different churches (one event hosted by New Bethlehem Baptist Church and one by leaders from The Church at Sugar Creek) as well as one funded wholly by the GBA Student Leader Fellowship Fund. We budgeted for three to four fellowships for the 2022-2023 budget calendar. The next fellowship will be tentatively planned for the holiday season (Nov.-Jan.) of 2023-2024. The GBA Youth Team will be seeking a church/student leader to host the next fellowship.

TENNESSEE BAPTIST MISSION BOARD REPORTS

Baptist Memorial Health Care System-Memphis, TN-Jason Little, President & CEO

Baptist Memorial Health Care began as a 150-bed hospital in downtown Memphis in 1912. It was formed by the Southern Baptist Conventions of Tennessee, Mississippi, and Arkansas because they recognized a tremendous need for a health care facility in this part of the country. The hospital's early days were rough – at one point, it almost closed – but eventually it grew to become the largest private hospital in the world. The hospital played a very important role in the history of health care in the 20th century, celebrating many firsts along the way.

The Baptist Memorial Health Care system was created in 1981 to provide an integrated health care delivery system offering a full continuum of care to communities throughout the Mid-South. Today, a total of 22 hospitals in Arkansas, Tennessee, and Mississippi; an 800-member physician group; and dozens of other entities are affiliated with Baptist.

Baptist Memorial Health Care's staff chaplains are a part of the health care team. Patients, family members or employees know that they can ask for a chaplain at any time to augment our health care with spiritual or emotional care. In our hospitals, our chaplains represent their own faith but often deal with spiritual issues that transcend denominational lines.

The Rev. Jimmy Terry Preaching Series, hosted by Baptist's Pastoral Care Department, observed its sixth anniversary this year. The series, named in memory of a beloved member of Baptist's Board of Trustees and the founder of Tabernacle Baptist Church in Clarksville, Tennessee, welcomes a speaker – usually an ordained Baptist minister – each month to deliver an evangelical message to employees, physicians, patients and visitors from Baptist's flagship hospital. The message is broadcasted live to all 22 Baptist hospitals. Video recordings of each event on our Facebook page have been viewed more than 166,900 times and have reached 170,300 people in the past year.

In January, Baptist Memorial Health Care celebrated the grand opening of our new Baptist Arlington Emergency Department in Arlington, Tennessee. The \$16 million facility measures 35,000 square feet and offers eight patient rooms and CT scan, X-ray and ultrasound imaging technology. A Baptist Medical Group primary care office, an imaging center and a helipad are also located on the campus.

Baptist Health Sciences University welcomed newly named president Hampton Hopkins, Ed.D., who will oversee the opening of the university's new College of Osteopathic Medicine, which earned pre-accreditation this year. It's the first school of its kind in the Mid-South and will welcome its first class of medical students for the 2024-25 academic year. A special event to commemorate the beginning of construction on the Baptist University College of Osteopathic Medicine building took place in June, during which a Bible was placed in a capsule in the facility's foundation.

Baptist played a significant role in the aftermath of a destructive tornado in Tipton County in March. Despite damage to Baptist Memorial Hospital-Tipton's roof and canopy, and personal property damage and loss for many of our team members, the staff at Baptist Tipton performed heroically, even delivering a baby during the storm. Baptist Ambulance provided 911 ambulance service and routed ambulances from nearby counties to help with the disaster response.

In April, Baptist held a dedication and ribbon cutting for Dorothy's Cottage, a 4,100-square-foot expansion of Baptist Centers for Good Grief. Named in honor of Dorothy Lee Wilson, wife of Holiday Inn founder and entrepreneur Kemmons Wilson, Dorothy's Cottage provides a safe environment for grieving children, teens and adults to explore and express grief for the loss of a loved one.

The Jackson Clinic, one of the largest physician practices of its kind, and Baptist Memorial Health Care held a topping out ceremony and beam signing last July to celebrate a major milestone for a new outpatient medical campus in Jackson, Tennessee. The event marked the placement of the topmost beam on a 134,966-square-foot, \$62 million, two-story medical office building, which will be located on the campus. Baptist will lease approximately 40,000 square feet of the building for an outpatient surgery center that will include eight operating rooms and four procedure rooms. The Jackson Clinic will lease approximately 70,000 square feet and offer diagnostic imaging, laboratory, pharmacy, and specialty services.

In January, Baptist Union City celebrated the opening of its new, \$10 million physician office building in Union City, Tennessee. It will serve as the home of the newly named Baptist Medical Group-Women's Health Center of Union City. The clinic has 18 exam rooms, two procedure rooms, two ultrasound suites, a lab, and a large conference room.

The Leapfrog Group recently awarded "A" Hospital Safety Grades to Baptist Union City and Baptist Carroll County to recognize their achievements in protecting patients from harm and error in the hospital.

Baptist Booneville and Baptist Union City both earned a five-star rating in the Center for Medicare and Medicaid Services' Overall Hospital Quality Star Ratings for 2022. Only 429 hospitals nationwide were given this rating.

Baptist Union City was awarded a three-year, \$1.5 million grant by the Health Resources & Services Administration's Rural Public Health Workforce Training Network Program for education, training and employment opportunities for community paramedics/emergency medical technicians and respiratory therapists. Baptist was also awarded \$5.5 million to expand the critical care unit at Baptist Collierville and received \$3.5 million to purchase an autonomous nursing robot that can be controlled from a central hub at our corporate offices.

Harrison-Chilhowee Baptist Academy (dba The King's Academy)

This year, Harrison-Chilhowee Baptist Academy celebrates 144 years of Christ-centered education in East Tennessee. For the past thirty years, Tennessee Baptist's accredited Christian boarding and day school has operated as The King's Academy. Students from across the globe are the Academy's most distinctive feature, with over 1,100 students and 101 nations represented since 1935.

The 2022-23 academic year has come to a close and will go down as a very successful year in the lengthy history of The King's Academy. The goal of this associational report is to provide transparent information regarding the state of The Academy, to highlight exciting additions, and clearly communicate what is expected in the coming year.

While no year will ever be perfect, as we have many obstacles to conquer and the fact that we are inherently not perfect, this past year has been successful in providing stability and setting up the successful future of The Academy. As an administrator, I seek to monitor numbers as they are an indicator of our schools' health and growth. Below is a quick look at TKA by the numbers for the 2022-23 academic year:

- 13: TKA was blessed to start the year with a 13% increase in enrollment from the previous year.
- 16: In the spirit of global outreach, we are thrilled to announce that The King's Academy has reached over 16 nations this past year.
- 32: Students who called our Residence Life Program Home (rebuilding the depleted numbers due to Covid-19)
- 35: Number of Love Where We Live (LWWL) projects that served our community.
- 27: This is my favorite number of all. This year 27 students accepted Jesus Christ as their personal Lord and Savior.
- 1,000,000: This represents the faithful amount that has been raised collectively to the Legacy Fund and tuition assistance funds this year. These gifts represent the faithful support of so many.
- 75: The amount of faculty and staff who faithfully poured into our students on a daily basis.
- 1: The audience for which we do what we do: our Lord.

The King's Academy is positioned to make an even larger impact on our community and world in our 144th year of operation because of the cooperation, support and generosity of Tennessee Baptists. Please join me in praying that the Lord will continue to maximize the reach of this ministry as we continue to strive to develop servant leaders who will change the world for Christ.

Carson-Newman University

From a dream, to development, to its August 1851 opening, Baptists of this state have been instrumental in the creation and maintenance of Carson-Newman. Your partnership and support enable us as Christian educators to help our students reach their full potential as educated citizens and worldwide servant-leaders.

We have had a blessed year at Mossy Creek. Highlights of this past year includes:

- The University entered its second year of a five-year strategic plan entitled “*Acorns to Oaks: Pursuing God’s Preferred Future,*” seeing the completion and opening of the Drama and Ted Russell Center, home to C-N’s health sciences as the plan’s first major project.
- As part of *Acorns to Oaks*, C-N also broke ground on its first student-residential complex in two decades. West Campus Commons is the largest construction project in C-N’s history and is slated to open Fall 2024.
- University Board of Trustees approved a new Campus Master Plan that will guide decision-making over the next 20 years regarding construction, renovation and campus experience.
- A new partnership with Morgan County Correction Complex offers selected inmates the opportunity to pursue a Bachelor of Arts in Christian Studies with an emphasis in Ministry Studies. Dr. Phil Young is the new director of the program.
- As part of a new archeology minor, Carson-Newman University, in collaboration with the Hebrew University of Jerusalem and the American Veterans Archaeological Recovery, completed the initial groundbreaking excavation project at the ruins of Herod the Great’s majestic desert fortress, Hyrcania.
- Fortune Media Group named C-N as having one of the nation’s best online nursing programs (No. 38 in the U.S.). U.S. News & World Report ranked both C-N’s nursing and education online programs No. 2 in Tennessee in their respective categories. The University was also named a College of Distinction and a Christian College of Distinction by the organization Colleges of Distinction.
- Partnering with NAMB’s GenSend program, C-N students took part in mission trips during the year to such locations as Denver, Los Angeles, New Orleans, Washington, D.C. and Barcelona, Spain.
- University students and staff teamed up with members of TrueLife Church of Jefferson City and Blue Springs Baptist of Rutledge for a mission trip to Honduras. The team of 14 visited schools, and homes, and met with and encouraged missionaries.
- Carson-Newman hosted the 2022 East Tennessee Evangelism Rally, featuring award-winning Christian music artists Nic Gonzales and Jaci Velasquez, as well as guest speaker Dr. Steve Gaines, senior pastor of Bellevue Baptist Church.
- In partnership with Manley Baptist Church, we were grateful that students and staff chose to express public professions of faith in Christ by being baptized in Mossy Creek on C-N’s campus during the fall. There were many other public professions of faith who chose to pursue baptism at their home churches instead of in Mossy Creek. We celebrate that life-changing impact of the Gospel that is transforming lives across our campus.
- Members of C-N campus community banded together for its annual Operation Inasmuch Day of Service. Teams took part in service projects throughout four East Tennessee counties.
- Younger Associates concluded an economic study indicating the Baptist institution produces an \$84 million annual impact on the local area economy.
- The University presented the annual Ken Sparks Award to pastor, missionary, evangelist and trainer for church planters, Dr. Wade Akins.

Highlights presented here are made possible because of the cooperation, support and generosity of Tennessee Baptists.

Union University

Over the past year, Union University had the opportunity to celebrate its bicentennial and reflect on 200 years of God’s faithfulness. What a history! The Lord has provided for Union time and time again and poured out blessing upon blessing as we have equipped thousands of students to serve the church and society. Generations of Union alumni have taken their gospel witness into all the world, making a difference for Christ in their families, their churches, their workplaces, and their communities.



As we have looked back on our past, we have also dreamed about what God will do through Union in the future. Union trustees in December approved a strategic plan entitled *Protinus* that will guide the university’s operational goals and planning over the next five years. *Protinus* is a Latin word that means “to move immediately, forward, continuously, uninterruptedly, as from the very first.”

Protinus includes four major themes – advancing Christ-centered higher education, pursuing faithful innovation throughout and across campuses, continuing to solidify and develop Union’s financial position and enhancing Union’s culture of shared life and commitment to one another’s flourishing.

Each theme includes several goals for the university to accomplish by 2027. For example, the theme of advancing Christ-centered higher education includes such goals as focusing each department and athletic team on intentional student discipleship and providing leadership to kindred Christ-centered institutions of higher education.

Another goal in the plan is the completion of a comprehensive fundraising campaign. Union launched “Union 200: Tradition. Truth. Transformation.” in September with an \$80 million goal. About \$38 million has been given and pledged toward that goal thus far.

Other highlights from the past year:

- Plans are underway for a new academic building on campus that will house the McAfee School of Business and the departments of computer science and engineering.
- In partnership with the TBMB, Union hosted its first youth apologetics conference, EQUIP!, with more than 260 attendees.
- The Union debate team won another national championship, and the Cardinal & Cream was named the best college magazine in the South for the second straight year.
- The College of Pharmacy’s class of 2022 scored a 92 percent pass rate on the NAPLEX, the highest rate in the state and the 12th highest nationally.

None of this would be possible without the Lord’s provision and without the support of Tennessee Baptists. We are grateful for your friendship, and we ask that you would continue to pray for Union as we seek to be faithful to our mission.

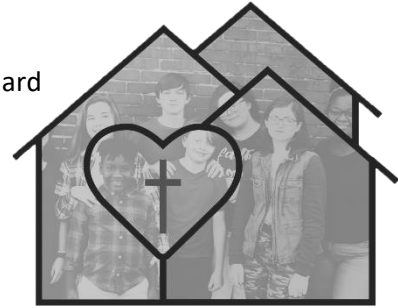

Because of the faithfulness of churches, businesses and individuals who have a heart for children and families who are struggling, we have been able to serve nearly 200 children and their families this year. Thank you for your prayers, for your service, and for sharing your financial resources with TBCH. Our ministry operates without the use of government funds. We have chosen to rely on God's provision through His people to supply the resources necessary to meet the needs of the children and families we serve.



In 2022-23 TBCH continues to forge ahead with our "Safe Environment Project." One of the core values that drives our ministry is that we will provide a safe environment for the children we serve. TBCH has made changes throughout the years to fulfill this core value and we are now faced with the need to make the change in our residential care program to individual bedrooms and baths for each resident. Because of what many of our children have experienced or been exposed to, this need becomes more apparent as each year passes.

TBCH is making sacrifices to bring this vision into reality. We are reducing the size of our campuses without reducing the number of children we serve. While liquidated property is helping us put our plans into action we are still in great need of your financial assistance. Thank you to those of you whose churches give faithfully to the Cooperative Program and who also make a direct gift to TBCH through the Mother's Day Offering or through your annual missions offerings. May your tribe increase!

I am asking the Lord for \$30 million to bring all three campuses up to date so that we will be set to care for children in a safe environment for the next 75 years! Did that sentence make you gasp?! Then follow it with this one: *"Ah Lord God! Behold, You have made the heavens and the earth by Your great power and by Your outstretched arm! Nothing is too difficult for You"* (Jeremiah 32:17). We sense strongly that this is the Lord's direction for us to take and we are trusting Him to make a way. If you have questions about the "Safe Environment Project" and how you can be a part of it, I would love to have a conversation with you!

Since 1891, thousands of children's lives have been changed through the ministry of TBCH. Tennessee Baptist Adult Homes, Inc.

Our Baptist Village Humboldt ministry remains in the construction phase. We had high hopes of finishing the first phase that includes the first two duplex units by the spring of 2023. However, there have been various issues, mostly related to the availability of building supplies, that have caused some significant delays. So, we are a bit cautious about making predictions about when this ministry will be available. That said, we have a measured degree of confidence that these first two duplexes will be completed before the end of 2023. When the entire Baptist Village Humboldt project is completed, there will be 10 duplexes serving 20 financially needy retired pastors and missionaries.

The SOAR fund (Supplying Ongoing Aid to Residents) that was established through the Tennessee Baptist Foundation in 2019 has suffered significant losses, just as all investments everywhere over these past four years. Because of these investment losses and the rate of inflation over the past 2 years, we were forced to invade the SOAR fund in order to keep operating our group homes and to continue our development of Baptist Village Humboldt. Our financial losses, since the dissolution of our nursing home about 8 years ago, have placed us in a position of needing additional funding in the very near future. This circumstance has created the need for us to seek additional funding from the Cooperative Program. Your gifts to the Cooperative Program and to the Father's Day Offering will allow us to stop spending our quickly dwindling reserves and to continue providing a Christian home for the men and women in our six group homes.

Speaking of our Father's Day Offering, receipts are pretty much on target to come in at a rate consistent with previous years. Now more than ever, however, we are hopeful that we will far surpass previous years and even exceed our goal. Again, exceeding our FDO goal along with an increase in Cooperative Program funding will allow us to avoid using any further reserves.

We reported last year that after having to cancel Special Friends Camp for three years in a row (2020-2021-2022) due to our inability to find Counselors. The result of those cancellations is that TBAH has determined that we will not seek to have Special Friends Camp for the foreseeable future and possibly ever again.

Since 1835, the *Baptist and Reflector* has produced and shared articles and columns that impact Tennessee Baptist Convention churches.

The *B&R* is mailed to nearly homes, 26 weeks a year, reaching nearly 40,000 readers. For nearly 10 years in a row, the *B&R* staff has been recognized for excellence in journalism by the Baptist Communicators Association in its annual awards competition.

In addition, the *B&R* website has grown steadily since it was introduced in late 2015. Our number of page views grows steadily. We also send out a weekly newsletter highlighting not only the top stories in the print issue but other articles that are posted on the website but may not appear in the print issue.

The goal of the paper is to “tell the story of Tennessee Baptists” through news, feature stories and photographs. As in the past, the paper this year placed a major emphasis on what Tennessee Baptists are doing to reach the world for Christ by focusing on stories related to the Five Objectives, the strategic plan messengers to the Tennessee Baptist Convention adopted in 2014.

In addition, the *B&R* has helped inform Tennessee Baptists in 2022-23 about Blue Oval City, located in Haywood County, roughly 40 miles east of Memphis. Blue Oval City in Stanton will eventually become a massive Ford plant that covers approximately 4,100 acres.

Tennessee Baptists are being intentional and assertive about making an impact for Christ in Blue Oval City. Upcoming articles will continue to keep readers informed of the numerous opportunities that will be available in the months and years to come in West Tennessee.

The *Baptist and Reflector* continues to utilize social media tools such as Twitter and Facebook and other outlets to keep Tennessee Baptists aware of breaking news.

The staff monitors trends that could affect Tennessee Baptists and prints those stories to keep readers informed. We also have kept our readers informed of current events throughout the Southern Baptist Convention as well.

The paper continually seeks to enlist new subscribers. The Church Trial Plan is still available for churches that want to introduce the paper to its members. We need more churches willing to send the paper to their leadership such as deacons, Sunday School teachers, etc. We plan to reinstitute the “Friends of the *B&R*” program this year to help increase subscriptions. Information will be forthcoming in the coming months.

Tennessee WMU encourages and equips churches and individuals to engage in missions learning and involvement that enables them to fulfill the Great Commission. This report shares information about some of the state events, ministries, and initiatives that have taken place.

In September 2022, WMU began a four-year Project HELP: Mental Health emphasis to raise awareness of this important issue and equip members to lead and champion mental health initiatives in the church and local communities.

Three high school students were chosen to serve on the 2022-23 Tennessee Youth Venture Team – Lydia Nakamine and Emma Henley from Red Bank Baptist in Chattanooga and Jacob Murray from Silver Springs Baptist in Mt. Juliet. The students participated in a team retreat and bi-monthly virtual meetings for discipleship, mentoring, and missional study.

Tennessee WMU produced the *SPORTS JAM* missions event kit for children in grades 1-6 with plans, ideas, tips, and instructions to help churches host a missions event for the children in their church or community. The event kit included a Bible lesson, missions lesson highlighting IMB missionaries in Spain, and suggestions for crafts, games, and mission projects.

The 2022 Connection was held at FBC Sevierville on September 30 – October 2 and had 87 youth girls and leaders representing 11 churches in attendance. The event featured Bible study leader Amy-Jo Girardier, IMB missionary speaker Amy Jones from Germany, and local missionaries Jodie Lamon and Melanie Hart reaching internationals in Pigeon Forge and Gatlinburg.

RA Camp-o-Ree celebrated its 50th anniversary on October 14-16, 2022, at Linden Valley Baptist Conference Center with over 350 boys, leaders, and personnel in attendance. This missions camping event for boys grades 1-12 is hosted by Mid-South Royal Ambassadors and Tennessee WMU.

The 2023 Missions Get-Together was held at Brentwood Baptist Church on March 16-18, with a total attendance of 644 people representing over 132 churches. The event featured Bible study leader Mary Wiley and national WMU executive director Sandy Wisdom-Martin. Participants brought over 77,000 items for Christian Job Corps sites in Tennessee through the event ministry project. \$18,814.79 was given through the event **missions offering benefiting** the We Must Have a Place/Linden Valley Village Project (90%) and the TN WMU Touch Tomorrow Today Endowment (10%),

The 2023 Tennessee WMU Annual Meeting occurred on March 17 during the Friday morning general session of Missions Get-Together. The meeting included highlights of the work of Tennessee WMU and the election of 2023-24 state officers and new Executive Board members.

- State Officers: President: Ramona Hicks, Recording Secretary: Linda Rader, Vice President, East: Sheila Hall, Vice President, Middle: Kim Griffin, Vice President, West: Sandy Loudon
- Executive Board members: Tracey Gholson, Becky Jackman, Jean Warren

Tennessee WMU awarded \$39,100 in scholarships to 42 students attending graduate school, seminary, and undergraduate schools in Tennessee during the 2023-24 school year. These scholarships are funded through endowments, invested funds, and the Golden Offering for Tennessee Missions.

Christian Job Corps is a ministry of WMU that seeks to help men and women break the cycle of poverty through job and life skill classes, Bible study, and mentoring. There are currently 19 Tennessee CJC sites - 14 Christian Women's Job Corps and five Christian Men's Job Corps.

As Tennessee WMU celebrates our 135th birthday on October 19, 2023, we are excited about the possibilities and opportunities in the days and years ahead.

2023 NAMB SBC Ministry Report

“It’s all about the gospel.” That is the most common phrase you will hear or see written at the North American Mission Board. Everything we do—evangelism, church planting, compassion ministry and chaplaincy—helps Southern Baptists take the gospel to North America.

Our work would not be possible without the generosity and faithfulness of Southern Baptists. Nearly 3,000 (2,961) missionaries depend on that giving for the funding and resourcing of their ministries throughout North America. In 2022, Southern Baptists gave an all-time record high of \$68.9 million to the Annie Armstrong Easter Offering, all of which funds missionaries and evangelistic resources on the field. This, combined with faithful giving through the Cooperative Program, allows NAMB to help Southern Baptists start new churches, meet needs and share Christ during times of crisis and provide evangelism resources churches are utilizing to help members be on mission with the gospel.

Here are some highlights of what God is doing:

Evangelism. Tim Dowdy became vice president of NAMB’s Evangelism Group in 2022, and he has a great heart for doing whatever it takes to help churches lead people to the Lord. Our team engages with and trains thousands of churches each year. Our GenSend team shared the gospel with thousands of students and equipped pastors and other leaders through training events. We provide free evangelism kits and other resources churches can utilize. Refresh, our pastor wellness retreat, blessed more than 1,800 pastors and their wives in 2022.

Send Network. NAMB helps Southern Baptists plant churches everywhere for everyone in North America through Send Network. In 2022, Southern Baptists added 917 new congregations. That includes 639 new church plants, 106 replants, 126 new affiliations and 46 new campuses. In November, a record number of church planters—216—attended our Send Network Orientation. Send Network also gained a new leader— Vance Pitman—in 2022.

Send Relief. Send Relief, our compassion ministry partnership with the International Mission Board, is seeing remarkable growth. While our largest responses in 2022 related to the refugee crisis in the Ukraine and Hurricane Ian in Florida, thousands more were served through this incredible ministry. We now have 20 Send Relief Ministry Centers in North America. Through churches mobilizing and responding in 2022, there were 37,759 individuals engaged to serve 246,898 people across diverse communities in North America.

Chaplaincy. NAMB endorses and trains chaplains on behalf of Southern Baptists. Currently there are 3,350 NAMB-endorsed chaplains.
