In Memory of Mrs. Joyce Brown




Mrs. Joyce Brown of Mason Hall passed away on October 17, 2020.

Gibson Baptist Association Annual Meeting New Bethlehem Baptist Church - Dyer, Tennessee - October 25, 2021

- Call to Order The meeting was called to order at 6:30 by moderator Shawn Allred, pastor of FBC Kenton. Eighty-one messengers were present representing twenty-nine churches. Leadership Team leader Bryan Morris, pastor of New Hope, made the motion to seat the messengers for the 98th annual session by acclamation. Motion was approved.
- 2. Welcome and Prayer John Coleman, host pastor, New Bethlehem Baptist Church, congratulated Bro. Roger for 50 years in the ministry. He also led the congregation in the opening prayer.
- 3. Congregational Song Jared Poore, Minister of Music, New Bethlehem, led the congregation in the song "Open the Eyes of My Heart."
- 4. Theme Interpretation Tim Newby, pastor of Oak Grove, read from Esther 4. He shared that God placed Esther where He wanted her to be. God's will is accomplished no matter where it occurs. We should take our problems to God first.
- 5. Financial Report Jim Acree, treasurer, member of FBC Dyer, shared that we more than met the budget for the year 2021. Eston Hurst made the motion to accept the financial report as presented. Pat Wollam, Salem Baptist Church, seconded the motion which was approved. *The Financial Reports can be found on pages 26-30.*
- 6. Nominating Committee Pat Wollam, member of Salem, presented the recommendations from the nominating committee. The nominations were approved as presented. *The Nominating Report can be found on pages 1-3.*
- Budget Committee Mike Garner, chairman, and member of New Bethlehem, presented the
 proposed budget from the budget committee. The budget for the new year is \$200,920. He
 moved the adoption of the budget, and it was approved.

 The 2021-2022 budget can be found on page 34.
- 8. Miscellaneous Business Randy Beals, pastor of New Haven, presented the recommendation from the Credentials Committee. The Credentials Committee report recommends that the association receive Elevate Baptist Church in Milan as a member of the GBA, and that their messengers be seated immediately. The recommendation passed by acclamation.
- 9. Special Music Scott Shepherd, TBMB, sang "Jesus Christ, Unchanging." He wrote this song for the promotion of the Golden Offering for Tennessee Missions.

- 10. Theme Interpretation Jake Fry, pastor of Emmanuel Humboldt, read 2 Timothy 4:1-5. He stated that our mission stays the same; we are to preach, teach, and submit to the Word.
- 11. Seek Team Report Steve Littleton, pastor of Gibson Baptist, shared about evangelism ministries during the past year. He mentioned the Prayer Tent at the Gibson County Fair. The Seek Team held an evangelism training event at White Hall Baptist Church prior to the Gibson County Fair. He also stated that the association had 35 more baptisms this year than last year. Seek team reports can be found on pages 39-40.

- 12. Strengthen Team Report James Rogers, pastor of Oakwood, presented the team report. He stated that the Transition House for Women coming out of jail is up and running. He shared about the Fields of Faith event held at Peabody High School. Bob Moore, men's ministry director, did an outstanding job in putting the event together. There were over 500 students present, and 23 professions of faith that resulted from this night. Strengthen team reports can be found on pages 41-48.
- 13. Send Team Report Eric McLemore, pastor of Northside, made two recommendations:
 - 1. We recommend that the Wingo Offering goal for 2021-2022 be \$23,500 with distribution as follows:
 - 70% IMB Projects, 25% North American/TBMB/GBA projects, 5% Disaster Relief Fund.
 - 2. We also recommend that the International Missions Projects/Trips be increased as follows: first time volunteers from \$400 to \$500 and repeat volunteers from \$300 to \$400. The recommendations passed by acclamation.

- 17. Election of Officers Shawn Allred, moderator, asked for nominations from the floor. Bryan Morris was nominated for Moderator by Bro. David Powell. The nomination was seconded by Joey Hufstedler. He was elected by acclamation. Bro. James Rogers was nominated for Assistant Moderator by Bro. Andy King and seconded by Pat Wollam. He was elected by acclamation. David Powell nominated Leann Cherry as Clerk, and Joey Hufstedler seconded. She was elected by acclamation. For the position of treasurer Andy King nominated Jim Acree, and Bryan Morris seconded. He was elected by acclamation. Bro. Joel Pigg was nominated by Pat Wollam for Assistant Treasurer. He was elected by acclamation.
- 18. Time and Place Resolutions Report Bro. Garry Burkacki presented the following recommendations:
 - The committee recommended that the 2022 annual meeting of the Gibson Baptist Association be held on October 24,2022, and that the host church be The Church at Sugar Creek.
 - The committee also recommended the adoption of the following resolutions.

RESOLVED, that these same messengers call on the North American Mission Board, its trustees, and its President, Dr. Kevin Ezell to do all that can be done to restore the relationships that have been injured by the actions of the North American Mission Board and Dr. Kevin Ezell.

Executive Board Report

The Executive Board has as its purpose to conduct the business of the association between annual meetings. The Board is composed of one elected representative from each church and the pastor of the church. The Constitution and Bylaws require the board to meet quarterly. The Executive Board has as its purpose to conduct the business of the association between annual meetings.

January Executive Board Meeting highlights:

Nineteen members were present representing eleven churches. Bro. Roger Stacy reminded the board that he was elected fourteen years ago at the January meeting. Many churches have canceled services and have gone virtual due to COVID-19. Kelly Wall from Birth Choice shared a number of statistics. There were 140 babies saved from abortion and 896 gospel presentations were made to clients. The mobile unit is being utilized five days a week. Sheilah Spangler, WMU Director, shared that the WMU Get-Together would be virtual due to COVID. Pastor Isaac Solis, pastor of Iglesia Baptista Maranatha (Maranatha Baptist Church) was present along with Bro. Greg McFadden. Pastor Isaac shared that the new work would be launched on January 31. SugarCreek is the sponsoring church, and GBA is also a sponsor of the work.

April Executive Board Meeting highlights:

Bro. Roger shared about the 48 Gibson County jail mates that were baptized in the Gibson County Lake. He was present for the dedication of the new ultrasound machine at Birth Choice, along with Dr. Randy Davis. He asked the board for authorization to move the checking account from BancorpSouth to Security Bank & Trust Company. A motion was made and approved to make the transfer. Sheilah Spangler, WMU Director, called attention to the 100th celebration of the GBA WMU in 2024. She shared that plans are being made now for the celebration. Christy Skelton, director of CWJC, shared that they are still needing house manager for the Transitional Home. Bro. Steve Littleton, Seek Team Leader, shared that the team is planning three evangelistic events for the Gibson County Fair: Evangelism training, August 20 & 21; Feeding of the Carnival works on Sunday afternoon when workers arrive; a prayer tent during the fair. Bob Moore, Men's Ministry leader informed the board about "Fields of Faith" occurring on September 15 at 7:00 at Peabody High School

July Executive Board Meeting highlights:

Bro. Roger promoted the mission trip to Brazil the week of September 27—October 5, 2021. He shared a vision of developing the vacant lot between the GBA office and Carey Counseling. He shared that he would like to see a pavilion with a stage area, picnic tables, grills, and a play area for games. Churches could use the facilities as well as groups in the association. The board approved the Leadership Team to appoint a committee to study the feasibility of the idea. Bro. Roger shared about the Alliance Defending Freedom (ADF). This is affordable legal representation for churches should they be sued. The Tennessee Baptist Convention has partnered with ADF. Sheilah Spangler, WMU director, gave an update on plans for the 100th Anniversary of the GBA WMU celebration. Bro. Bryan Morris, member of the Seek Team, updated the board on the plans for the Gibson County Fair and the evangelism training at White Hall Baptist Church in August. Bob Moore, Men's Ministry leader, gave an update on the softball season and announced the winners of the tournament. He also shared about the Fields of Faith event in September at the Peabody High School. TJ Gilliam a nationally known speaker will be the speaker. This event is for teenagers across the county and across denominations also surrounding counties are invited. Tony Moore with the agency "Touching Hearts at Home" shared about an upcoming event at Whitehall Baptist Church on September 23rd for Senior Adults and families.

Director of Missions Report

(Associational Missionary)

We have had a busy associational year despite the continuing plague of the COVID-19 virus. Every year I meet with our team leaders of our three priority teams to plan the Ministry Plan for the new associational year. We were able to see many of our ministry plans implemented this year, in contrast to the previous year. Our teams have worked hard to envision a strategy to strengthen churches and reach the lost with the gospel this coming year.

We have purchased the equipment to livestream on our Facebook closed group. We have approximately 950 members in our group. We are now livestreaming our Executive Board meetings and other events.

Last year I reported that our Budget & Finance committee asked us to work toward going digital with the Vision newsletter. We slowly made the transition this year. We currently mail only a little over 200 newsletters to those who prefer to receive the vision by regular mail, or who receive the Vision digitally.

This year we set up online giving on our GBA website to make it convenient for churches or individuals to send contributions. Our website is: gbalife.org.

Our Minute Book this year is dedicated to the following people: (1) in memory of Mrs. Patricia Lou Lykins, member of Northerns Chapel, wife of Bro. Dillard Lykins; (2) in memory of Mrs. Joyce Brown, a member of Bethpage Baptist Church, faithful to WMU and CWJC and (3) in honor of Mr. Jim Acree, member of First Baptist Church, Dyer.

I attended the Replant Conference once again this year. This training is provided by the North American Mission Board in Alpharetta, Georgia. Southern Baptist are seeking to equip associations to address the continuing decline of many churches through church revitalization.

Our Block Party Wagon has a new jumper (bouncy house) that we purchased this year. Our old jumper was not in good shape to pass state inspection. We are awaiting the state inspector to give us the approval and certification necessary to begin using it.

I want to thank you for your continued gifts to meet the needs of our ministry with street children in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil. COVID-19 has made it difficult for the children to receive basic food needs, but your gifts have fed the children the past year.

I am thankful for the tremendous response from our churches and individuals in giving to the Waverly Disaster Relief Fund. We were able to send a check to the local association in the amount of \$42,000. These funds will help homeowners who lost everything and do not have insurance or federal assistance to rebuild.

For the first time in my tenure with GBA, we had a ministry presence at the Gibson County Fair. Volunteers served in our Prayer Tent. Prior to the fair, we offered evangelism training at White Hall Baptist Church with breakout sessions.

We were able to have our annual Deacons' Meetin' this year. Dr. Randy Davis, Executive Director of TBC brought a challenging message.

GBA was one of the sponsors of "Fields of Faith" on September 15, at the Peabody High School. There were 23 professions of faith and 11 other decisions recorded.

We partnered with the Tennessee Baptist Convention to offer a training conference entitled, <u>"Winning Our Harvest Field"</u>. Win Tennessee (WinTN) is an evangelism initiative of the convention. Eldad Baptist Church hosted the training.

Due to COVID-19, we have been unable to lead mission teams to Ohio or Brazil. However, September 27-October 5, we took a mission team to Rio de Janeiro, Brazil. Churches were strengthened and there were 214 professions of faith, and several discipleship Bible studies conducted.

I will complete my fifteenth (15th) year as your associational missionary (DOM) on March 1, 2022. April 15 will mark my 25th year as a Director of Missions in Tennessee. I am thankful for what God has done over these years, and I am confident God will continue to bless this great association of churches.

2021-2022 GUIDELINES FOR WINGO MISSION FUNDS

To receive Wingo Funds for any mission trip or project, all volunteers must undergo a background check with the GBA. This requirement follows the mission sending agencies of the Southern Baptist Convention and is for the legal prudence of the GBA. No funds will be dispersed for any trip or project until the background screening requirements are complete, and payment has been received.

BACKGROUND SCREENING REQUIREMENTS

- 1) Volunteers must submit three references using the reference forms provided by the GBA. The references must be from individuals who are not family members of the volunteers and must be at least 21 years of age. One of the three references must be from the pastor of the church where the volunteer is a member. In cases where the church is without a pastor, a staff member or chairman of deacons may serve as a reference.
- Volunteers must complete a personal interview questionnaire form provided by the GBA.
- 3) Volunteers under the age 18 are only required to submit reference forms and the personal interview questionnaire.
- 4) Volunteers who are older than 18 must have a background check through the company used by the GBA. A consent form will be provided for the volunteer to grant permission for the background check.
- 5) The volunteer will be responsible for paying the fee for the background check.
- 6) Volunteers are required to watch a child protection video provided by the GBA.
- 7) Volunteers are required to undergo background screening every four years with the GBA.
- 8) Churches participating in a mission trip other than a GBA led trip, shall conduct the background screening as outlined above. All background screening forms shall be maintained on file with the church. GBA will make available online background checks for churches. When a church has completed the background screening, an authorized representative of the church must sign a declaration statement provided by GBA, verifying that the background screening has been completed for every mission volunteer receiving Wingo Funds. Background screenings are valid for four years. In cases where a church receives a Church Scholarship (Multiple Scholarship), the same procedures must be followed along with a signed declaration statement to the GBA. Wingo funds will not be granted until such procedures are completed.

INTERNATIONAL MISSIONS PROJECTS

GBA Volunteers and churches participating in an official project of the Gibson Baptist Association, the Tennessee Baptist Convention, or the International Mission Board are eligible for travel assistance from the Wingo Fund account. Scholarships from this account primarily seek to encourage and help GBA volunteers (ages 15+ or a student who has completed 9th grade) to participate in a 'first time' mission trip. The following guidelines apply for use of Wingo Funds:

- 1) Funds are designed to assist volunteers who participate in an official IMB trip/project. First time international mission volunteers are eligible for a scholarship of \$500.
- 2) Volunteers who have previously participated in an official IMB project/trip are eligible for a \$400 scholarship once per associational calendar year, if it is an IMB project/trip.
- 3) Churches may request a multiple scholarship for volunteer team members of the same church once per calendar yr.
 - A multiple scholarship is designated when a group of volunteers from a single church participate in same project/trip.
 - A multiple scholarship amount will be limited to \$2,000 for the project/trip.
 - Only one multiple scholarship can be granted to a single church in the calendar year.
 - Additional scholarships may be awarded to other individuals of a church that has received a multiple scholarship (under existing guidelines) up to \$1,000 over and above the multiple scholarship.
 - Scholarship requests that exceed the \$3,000 limit for a church may be considered by the Send Team.
 - It is encouraged that first time volunteers be distributed their full \$400 scholarship from this amount, if possible.
- 4) Volunteers (first time or otherwise) not participating in a multiple scholarship project/trip with their church are still eligible for an individual scholarship once during the association calendar year.
- 5) Volunteers requesting funds must complete an application, available at the GBA office or by e-mail.
- 6) Wingo funds will be disbursed as early as possible with adequate notice prior to the date of the project/trip. Special considerations may be submitted to GBA.
- 7) Any special requests/needs for funds not addressed in these guidelines may be addressed to the necessary channel of the Send Team.
- 8) To help and encourage pastors who have never participated in an IMB international mission trip while serving as a GBA pastor, a \$ 1,000 pastor's scholarship will be available for five pastors each year (first come, first serve basis). To qualify, this must be the pastor's first IMB international mission trip as a GBA pastor. The pastor will still be eligible to receive Wingo funds for first-time mission volunteers along with this scholarship. It must be an official trip of the International Mission Board and be in compliance with all guidelines for Wingo mission funds.

DISASTER RELIEF PROJECTS

- 1) International disaster relief projects will qualify for travel assistance for GBA volunteers as listed above. However, for International Disaster Relief Projects, the minimum amount from this fund shall be \$500 for any volunteer from GBA, regardless of the number of trips/projects the volunteer may have participated in.
- 2) Matching funds from the local church is encouraged.
- 3) The maximum total contribution to volunteers from a single church for any specific project/trip travel assistance is \$2,000.
- 4) USA disaster relief projects qualify for gasoline reimbursement for volunteers from GBA going to a disaster point as called upon by the GBA or TBC.
- 5) An allocation of up to \$1,000 may be given to any area where a disaster has occurred. The gift and amount is to be determined by the Send Team of the association.

NORTH AMERICAN MISSIONS PROJECTS

GBA Volunteers and churches participating in an official project of the Gibson Baptist Association, the Tennessee Baptist Convention, or the North American Mission Board are eligible for travel assistance from the Wingo Fund account. Scholarships from this account primarily seek to encourage and help GBA volunteers (ages 13 and older or a student who has completed 7th grade) to participate in a 'first time' mission trip. The following guidelines apply for use of Wingo Funds:

- 1) Funds are designed to assist volunteers who participate in an official GBA, TBC, or NAMB trip/project more than 200 miles round trip from the Gibson Baptist Association Office out of state. First Time North American mission volunteers are eligible for a scholarship of \$150.
- 2) Volunteers who have previously participated in an official North American Mission project/trip are eligible for a \$100 scholarship once per associational calendar year, if it is a North American Mission project/trip.
- 3) Churches may request a multiple scholarship for volunteer team members of same church once in the calendar year.
 - A multiple scholarship is designated when a group of volunteers from a single church participate in the same project/trip.
 - A multiple scholarship amount will be limited to \$1,000 for the project/trip.
 - Only one multiple scholarship can be granted to a single church in the calendar year.
 - •Additional scholarships may be awarded to other individuals of a church that has received a multiple scholarship (under existing guideline) up to \$375 over and above the multiple scholarship.
 - Scholarship requests that exceed the \$1,375 limit for a church may be considered by the Send Team.
 - It is encouraged that first time volunteers be distributed their full \$150 scholarship from this amount, if possible.
- 4) Volunteers (first time or otherwise) not participating in a multiple scholarship project/trip with their church are still eligible for an individual scholarship once during the association calendar year.
- 5) Volunteers requesting funds must complete an application which is available at the GBA office or by e-mail.
- 6) Wingo funds will be disbursed as early as possible with adequate notice prior to the date of the project/trip. Special considerations may be submitted to GBA.
- 7) Any special requests/needs for funds not addressed in these guidelines may be addressed to the necessary channel of the Send Team.

WINGO OFFERING

Each year the Send Team of the association will recommend a goal for the Wingo Offering at the Annual Meeting of the GBA. Gifts from churches or individuals for these accounts are welcomed anytime during the budget year. However, a recommended date for receiving the Wingo Offering in the churches is the last Sunday of each month, May through September each year. Fund allocations from donations/offerings will be determined by the Send Team each year. The Wingo Offering is named in honor of Rev. Charles Wingo, first Director of Missions, GBA. Wingo Funds exist to encourage volunteers and church participation.

GIBSON BAPTIST ASSOCIATION REPORTS

SEND TEAM REPORTS

The Send Team makes the following recommendations:

- 1. We recommend that the Wingo Offering goal for 2021-2022 be \$23,500 with the distribution of funds as follows: 70% IMB Projects, 25% North American/TBMB/GBA Projects, and 5% Disaster Relief.
- 2. We recommend that the International Missions Projects & Trips be increased as follows: First-time volunteers from \$400 to \$500 and repeat volunteers from \$300 to \$400.

Wingo Fund

This year the Wingo offering goal was set at \$23,500. Our GBA churches and individuals gave a total of \$30,649.87. Last year our churches gave \$20,849.39, plus another \$206.00 received during the Annual Meeting, bringing the grand total to \$21,055.39. The Wingo funds are used to assist volunteers in participating in mission projects and trips during the year. We are thankful for our churches and individuals who give faithfully to support missions and the Wingo offering.

Wingo Funds were used this past year to help thirteen (13) individuals from ten (10) churches receive Wingo scholarships that helped with the cost of their mission trips to three (3) countries. Last year eighteen (18) volunteers from thirteen (13) churches received Wingo funds to travel to three (3) countries.

The total GBA/IMB scholarships distributed this past year was \$6,100. The following is a list of those receiving funds and the country in which they served.

Brazil Mission

Our mission trips to Brazil have been limited this past year. Brazil has been devastated with the delta variant of the coronavirus. This has prevented our teams from traveling to Brazil. With the recent outbreak of the delta variant in the United States, we have had to back off our planned trips.

A team of thirteen volunteers did work in an area of Rio de Janeiro the week of September 27-October 5, 2021. The team worked in an area known as Chapadão. Volunteers shared the gospel door-to-door and conducted several discipleship Bible studies with new believers. There were 214 recorded professions of faith. Our team was able to do immediate follow-up discipleship Bible studies with new converts.

We will be praying and planning on leading missions to Brazil in the coming year. The harvest is white, and the laborers are few.

Prayerfully consider joining with us to share the gospel in Brazil this coming year.

Ohio Mission

Our ministry and mission work with the West Central Baptist Association in Piqua, Ohio continues to be hindered due to the COVID-19 virus. We were not able to take any teams once again this year for this reason.

We continue to pray for the work in Ohio. The association covers ten (10) counties with over 550,000 residents. There are only 14 Southern Baptist Churches in these ten counties that compose the association.

We have focused on working with the association in the towns of Minister and New Bremen to help plant a church. There are other churches and needs where we have worked in previous years that still need mission teams. Our hope is that we can meet these needs soon.

While we are not able to do the normal mission work in our sister association, we can pray for the pastors, churches, and the lost in Ohio. We encourage our churches to pray for the cities of Minister and New Bremen specifically, that God would speak to a person of peace or many persons who are key to reaching the area.

BCM

We were not able to meet in person on campus this past year due to COVID-19. Our plans and ministry have been shut down with no possibility of continuing a presence and contact with the students.

Evangelism

Twenty-seven (27) GBA churches reported baptizing one hundred seventy (170) people this year. Last year twenty-seven (27) GBA churches reported baptizing one hundred thirty-five (135) people. We baptized thirty-five (35) more people this year.

GBA VBS Training

It was great to see so many churches back to having in-person, traditional VBS's during 2021. If we know anything about VBS we know that trained leaders equate to professions of faith during VBS. As a matter of record, for every trained leader there is one profession of faith among those attending. That is an awesome example of the impact training can and does have on our VBS's. It is this statistic that drives our association to want to promote training among our church VBS leaders.

I am happy to report that many of our churches took this statistic seriously and sent their leaders to our VBS training that was held April 22, 2021. We had 10 churches represented and 48 VBS leaders attend the training. Our clinic leaders did a wonderful job helping those who attended and taught various topics (7 total) some of these included evangelism, follow through, music, youth, and missions. One of the major format changes we made this year was to make all the sessions generic in nature, meaning that none of the sessions were based on any one curriculum. This means that all the sessions are applicable to every church that attends no matter what VBS material they choose to utilize.

I want to thank Salem Baptist Church and their Pastor Bro. Joel Pigg for hosting this year's VBS clinic and Mrs. Grace Gentry for her help with registration and promotion. Also, a big thanks goes to all those who prepared and led so well training our leaders. I have heard some wonderful reports of numerous salvation decisions that have come from our churches having VBS this year. Hearing these reports makes the all the planning and execution of VBS more than worth the effort. Make plans to attend our training in 2022 and let us plan to see more boys and girls saved by God's amazing grace.

STRENGTHEN TEAM REPORTS

We had a very successful and blessed year. Our ministries under our responsibility were able to complete their ministry plans despite the lingering coronavirus impeding some of plans.

The Christian Women's Job Corps ministry celebrated the opening of the Transition House (House of Hope) this year. The Night of Hope was also a tremendous success once again.

The GBA Youth Leadership Team held the annual Student Night at the Gibson County Fair. Ryan Keaton, TBC, was the guest speaker. Chapel Hill praise team led in worship. The attendance for the event was over two (200) hundred people. The Youth Team has many more plans for the coming year.

The annual Deacons' Meetin' was held at White Hall Baptist Church with an attendance of around 130 people. Dr. Randy Davis, Executive Director of the TBC, was the speaker. Dyer FBC praise and worship led in worship. Next year's event will be on September 15 at White Hall.

The Men's Ministry highlight was the Fields of Faith event held at the Peabody High School. There were over 500 students in attendance, with 23 registered professions of faith. Several other denominations were supportive and in attendance. Steve Cothran from Elevate Church led in worship. The program also featured testimonies from students.

The Senior Adult ministry is led by Martha Phelan. FBC Dyer hosted the spring event and featured Larry DeLawder as "Barney Fife." There were around 170 in attendance. The fall event was hosted by Salem Baptist Church. The Scott Shepherd family was the entertainment. There were around 175 in attendance.

Our Block Party Wagon has been used less the past two years due to the coronavirus. This year we upgraded our bouncy house (jumper). The one we were using is more than twenty years old. This new bouncy house will allow us to now receive our state certificate of inspection and use it in ministry.

We continue to see a steady drop in attendance in Sunday School in our association and across the Southern Baptist Convention. We decreased by 675 from last year's enrollment. Our Sunday School average decreased by 830 over the previous year. Some of this is due to COVID. The same decreases are also reflected in Discipleship Training.

Rhonda Poore is our Bible Drills director, and she continues to do an excellent work. The Bible Drills were held at White Hall. Church participation has decreased to only three churches having Bible Drillers. Eighteen drillers participated with eleven children qualifying for the Regional (State) drills.

Christian Women's Job Corps

Our journey together continues as we touch and become intertwined in the lives of others who need direction and encouragement. We consider the work in the ministry of CWJC to be an awesome and great privilege and continue to be amazed at all the ways that God is at work. During this past church year, we processed 53 applications for food and clothing, 27 applications for utility assistance through the Ministerial Alliance and witnessed to numerous others who came into the thrift store.

The community continues to shower us with great blessings. Some of those ways include: Woodmen of the World stocking our pantry with canned goods, additional canned goods came from Dan Rodamaker, President & CEO of GEMC in memory of our dear volunteer Joyce Brown, Sheriff's Dept. providing the mowing at our Transition House, piano donated to the house from the estate of Margaret Mitchell, Computer donated and setup by Bro. Eddie and Jack of Fellowship, new refrigerator and AC donated to the house by Barbara and Jerry Jones, food cards from local grocery merchants for our house, patio furniture donated by Sheila Bell and cameras donated and installed by Stacy Miller. Laquita Clark from UT Ext., which provides real life solutions and free research-based information to the community through agricultural programs, 4H and Family Consumer Science programs which include education programs that pay for all qualified individuals to go to college teaching a portion of our PFL classes. Another blessing came from our GOTM offering which was used to purchase cameras for the store.

Despite covid, the ministry has continued to thrive. We were privileged to have missionaries move into our Transition House where they remained until the end of April. We held our annual Christmas Party at Crenshaw's and recognized Judy Warren as our volunteer of the year. We utilized our shutdown time in January for packing up Christmas and organizing the store. We added two new members to our board in January, the Honorable Mark Johnson and Stacy Miller, CEO of W. Tenn. Correctional Services. Fellowship Baptist Church set up in front of the store giving out free popcorn and witnessing and the Customer Appreciation Event registered over 50 for hot dogs and drinks and handing out Bibles and tracts. Our Powered for Life class started with 5 participants and graduated 2. Graduation ceremony was attended by 21, and a catered meal was provided by Bro. Brian Griffith, our Chairman of the Board. We started a new class this August with several in attendance. We hired a new store manager who has made great improvements to the store. We updated our by-laws and policies and procedures. We were able to go back into the Jail for 5 weeks of classes until covid shut us down once again.

Finally, our Transition House is open! Our house manager started August 1st, and soon after we welcomed 2 residents. We appreciate all our volunteers helping with transportation, mentoring, purchase of groceries and other goods and Bible study as well as other classes.

Please mark your calendars for our Night of Hope on October 12th with doors opening at 5:30. We plan once again to have dinner, a silent auction and fashion show. This year it will be at the Roosevelt Hall here in Trenton. Please make reservations early as there will be limited seating.

Continuing Education

Continuing education is under the responsibility of the Strengthen Team of GBA.

We are working with the Tennessee Baptist Convention in the hopes that educational opportunities will be provided through Bible Institutes across the state. There is a great need for training and equipping lay people and pastors. Dr. Roger (Sing) Oldham is working to facilitate continuing education across the state.

For many years we provided training through the Seminary Extension Center at the GBA office. Over the years this ministry saw a drop off in attendance and we had to discontinue the training. Our six Southern Baptist Seminaries provide this course of study.

Bertie Thompson Ministry Scholarship

Mrs. Bertie Thompson wanted to see that future generations had the opportunity to receive training and an education for the Lord's work. She generously gave of her resources to establish the Bertie Thompson Scholarship.

Members of our GBA churches are eligible to apply for the scholarship and receive financial help. The scholarship is designed for those who sense a calling to serve in some aspect of Christian ministry and who maintain a certain grade point average. Many in our churches are not aware that this resource is available. We want to encourage you to help us promote this valuable financial resource that is available to help young men and women prepare for service to our Lord Jesus Christ.

We are happy to report that this year the scholarship was awarded to Bro. Randy Beals, pastor of New Haven Baptist Church in Milan. Bro. Randy is pursuing further studies to enrich and equip his call to ministry.

Block Party Wagon

The Block Party Wagon is a valuable tool for evangelism. Many of our churches use the BPW during Vacation Bible School, Fall Events, and other outreach ministries.

Due to the COVID-19 situation, very few churches have used the BPW this year. We are slowly seeing churches book the wagon again.

The state of Tennessee implemented new rules and regulations for the use of jumpers (bouncy houses) a couple of years ago. We have not been able to use our bouncy house due to the fact that our jumpers are old and not able to pass inspection.

We have recently purchased a new bouncy house. We have contacted the state for an inspection and are awaiting approval and certification to use the bouncy house.

The Block Party Wagon (BPW) is available for any GBA Church on a first-come-first-serve basis. The restriction is that it must be used in some form of evangelism outreach.

Sunday School

For the last several years, the Annual Church Profiles show that Sunday School attendance and enrollment continue to drop. The annual church profiles for 2020/21 show that Sunday School enrollment decreased again. Our churches reported a Sunday School enrollment of 4,727 which is a decrease of 675 from last year's enrollment of 5,402. Our Sunday School average attendance decreased by 830 people with the 2019/20 average attendance at 3,288 and the 2020/21 average attendance at 2,458.

Discipleship Training

Discipleship Training decreased this year from last year. This year eleven (11) of our churches reported a total enrollment of 450 in Discipleship Training. Last year nineteen (19) churches reported an enrollment of 1,128. The enrollment decreased by 678 members.

Bible Drills

In recent years, we've had several churches that have participated in Bible Drills. Sadly, in 2020-2021 we had dwindled down to three churches that participated in Children's Bible Drills. We did not have any participate in Youth Drills.

The participating churches were, FBC-Milan, FBC-Kenton, and New Bethlehem-Dyer. On the associational level, we had 18 drillers participate in Children's Bible Drills. Eleven children passed to Regionals (State). Seven children were in 3rd grade and were not eligible to proceed to the State level since Children's Bible Drill is for children in 4th through 6th grades. We appreciate Whitehall Baptist Church for hosting the associational drills.

Tennessee Baptist Children's Homes

2021 marks the 130th year that Tennessee Baptist Children's Homes has been welcoming children in hard places with the love of Christ. We are only able to welcome these children into our homes because of the faithfulness of churches, businesses and individuals who have a heart for children and families who are struggling. Thank you for your prayers, for your service and for sharing your financial resources with TBCH. We are committed as a ministry to operate without the use of government funds relying on God's people to supply the resources necessary to meet the needs of the children and families we serve.

The Lord has once again shown His faithfulness to this ministry by providing the necessary resources for us to care for 220 children during the first nine months of our fiscal year. **Five** of these children have been born again! Rest assured that TBCH is Christ centered in our approach to dealing with children and their families. We believe Jesus is the ultimate answer to all brokenness and our team unashamedly points people to Him in age-appropriate ways.

TBCH has provided **Residential Care** for 77 children since November 1, 2020, in our on-campus homes. Fourteen of these children have been successfully reunited with their families. TBCH is also committed to assisting those who age out of our program. These 18+ year-old **Independent Living** residents on our Chattanooga Campus receive continued support by our staff and learn a trade or attend college. We are committed to helping these young people get off to a good start in early adulthood. There are presently seven young people in our Independent Living program.

TBCH's **George Shinn Foster Care** program has served 143 children since November 2020 and has 74 foster homes on our team. Twenty-five children have been adopted into Christian families while 12 children are presently in foster-to-adopt situations!

Our foster home in **Oakdale** and our most recent newly opened home in **Kingsport** have the capacity to welcome large sibling groups of foster children. These two homes are both manned by families who sense a calling to care for vulnerable children and I am thankful for their willingness to help us serve children. TBCH is grateful for the churches and volunteers who are helping these ministry locations thrive!


TBCH's **Family Care** program stands ready to provide training for your church in child abuse awareness and prevention. **Stewards of Children** is a sexual abuse awareness training provided by Darkness to Light which is a non-profit committed to empowering adults to prevent child sexual abuse. This is a two-hour video-based curriculum containing the heroic stories of sexual abuse survivors. Baptist Memorial Health Care System

Memphis, Tennessee

Baptist Memorial Health Care began as a 150-bed hospital in downtown Memphis in 1912. It was formed by the Southern Baptist Conventions of Tennessee, Mississippi, and Arkansas because they recognized a tremendous need for a health care facility in this part of the country. The hospital's early days were rough – at one point, it almost closed – but eventually it grew to become the largest private hospital in the world. The hospital played a very important role in the history of health care in the 20th century, celebrating many firsts along the way.

The Baptist Memorial Health Care system was created in 1981 to provide an integrated health care delivery system offering a full continuum of care to communities throughout the Mid-South. Today, a total of 22 hospitals in Arkansas, Tennessee, and Mississippi; an 800-member physician group; and dozens of other entities are affiliated with Baptist.

Baptist Memorial Health Care's staff chaplains are a part of the health care team. Patients, family members or employees know that they can ask for a chaplain at any time to augment our health care with spiritual or emotional care. In our hospitals, our chaplains represent their own faith but often deal with spiritual issues that transcend denominational lines.

Because of the COVID pandemic, we had to pause the Rev. Jimmy Terry Preaching Series events – where each month, a speaker delivers an evangelical message at our flagship hospital –but we resumed it in July 2020 with limited in-person seating and an emphasis on virtual attendance. Since the beginning of this year, we've been gradually moving toward having more in-person attendance. Thousands of people virtually attended the sermons, and videos of the messages have been viewed 86,800 times on Facebook.

Baptist continued to be the Memphis area's source of truth and accuracy about COVID-19. To date, we have earned 74% of the COVID-19 news coverage, and Baptist's experts were interviewed for almost 1,000 print and TV news stories on national and local news outlets.

We are planning to break ground on our first freestanding emergency department (FSED) in September. Located in Arlington, Tennessee, a Memphis suburb, it will serve a four-county area that includes two communities that lost hospitals and don't have convenient access to emergency care. Today, many patients in these areas travel up to an hour to come to Baptist Memphis. The new FSED would cut that commute in half. The FSED will have eight rooms, a CT scan, X-ray, ultrasound imaging and a helipad. We'll also bring more than 30 high-wage, professional positions to the community.

2021 Annual Report to Associations

Since 1938 the Tennessee Baptist Foundation has been of service to Tennessee Baptists and Kingdom causes around the world. The assets under management of the Foundation have grown from \$6,577 to \$179 million during that time. God continues to bless this ministry and we are pleased to make our report to the associations as to highlights for the fiscal year 2020-21 thus far. The Foundation is pleased to offer the following services to Tennessee Baptists:

- Presenting informational Faith-based estate planning seminars for churches
- ♦ Working with individuals, helping develop distinctively Christian personal estate plans
- Assisting individuals in their establishment of various Charitable Trusts
- ♦ Serving as Trustee of trusts and funds committed to its care
- Providing investment services to Tennessee Baptist churches, associations and institutions
- **♦** Helping churches establish Legacy Ministries
- **♦** Facilitating loans to Tennessee Baptist churches/associations
- Providing grants for qualifying new ministries and projects

Highlights of the Foundation's stewardship thus far for this fiscal year include:

- ✓ Funds under management: Over 1,100
- √ Assets under management: \$178,965,513 (as of June 30, 2021)
- √ New fund additions as of June 30, 2021: \$998,838 (12 new funds)
- ✓ Educational scholarships: 164 totaling \$175,100 for 2021-2022 academic year. (Awarded over \$5.8 million in scholarships since 1987)
- ✓ Special Project Grants:
 - As of June 30, 2021, we have distributed \$35,400 to assist 8 ministry projects.
- ✓ Cooperative Program: \$442,575 as of June 30, 2021.

The academy remains focused on its VISION – Transformed Lives, Empowered by Christ-like Character, Pursuing Academic Excellence and Lifelong Service – and committed to its MISSION: The King's Academy inspires and equips students of all cultural backgrounds to fulfill their God-given potential in a nurturing, college preparatory community.

The academy continues to face challenges on the heels of the global pandemic, with the majority of operations shifting back to a new sense of normalcy and a return to on-campus learning and activities. Enrollment for the upcoming school year (2021-22) has eclipsed the previous year's numbers, and projections place the student body near the enrollment levels prior to the Covid-19 pandemic. Moving forward, the academy must balance the socio-economic demographics of academy families to remain financially feasible for both local and international students in order to remain a viable partner for faith-based education.

TKA welcomed Jeremy Sandefur as the new President/Headmaster for the 2021-2022 school year and is excitedly looking to the future. While the heritage of TKA is rich and deep, the days ahead are bright as the new administration focuses on developing servant leaders who will change the world for Christ. Through focusing on service leadership, TKA desires to reach the surrounding communities while providing a biblically based approach to curriculum and service instruction.

The newly formed "Love Where We Live" initiative will place TKA students in strategic partnerships throughout the communities of East Tennessee in order to serve and to learn more about the Lord through service. Day and Boarding students will participate in grade level mission projects to develop a deeper understanding of God's creation and to inspire a culture of service. TKA will seek to continue to be the choice for a Christ-centered, academically challenging education while fulfilling the Great Commandment of making disciples of all nations.

It is a distinct privilege for the academy family to partner with and serve alongside Tennessee Baptists in the mission of Christian education.

Carson-Newman University Associational Report 2021

Your partnership and support enable us as Christian educators to help our students reach their full potential as educated citizens and worldwide servant-leaders.

This past year has included:

- Carson-Newman's Board of Trustees approved a five-year strategic plan entitled "Acorns to Oaks: Pursuing God's Preferred Future." The strategy calls for new academic buildings, expanded athletic offerings, new and renovated facilities, enrollment growth and greater missional alignment. The plan culminates in 2026, which marks the 175th anniversary of C-N's founding.
- In July 2021, Carson-Newman launched the first project from the new strategic plan: breaking ground on the Drama and Ted Russell Center. The new 48,000 square-foot health sciences building will be home to C-N's Nursing Department. The three-story building is slated for completion in 2023.
- At the opening of the 2020-21 academic year, the University announced a record enrollment of 2,911 students. This marked two years in a row C-N celebrated an enrollment record. It also welcomed a record number of graduate students (1,189). The school later celebrated a record spring enrollment of 2,729.
- The University was featured by U.S. News & World Report, which ranked C-N in the top 10 in the state overall and second in Tennessee for social mobility. It also named C-N's online graduate education program No.1 in the state. The University was touted as the state's highest-ranked private school in the "Best Online MBA Program" category.
- In recognition of a lifetime of service by alumni and missionaries Dr. Bill and Linda Viel, C-N
 named its campus ministries building in their honor and renewed its focus on Gospel sharing
 and Gospel living.
- In the fall, the University hosted the Gospel Saturated Life Conference featuring Dr. Wade Akins of Pioneer Missions Global as its speaker. Students heard the power of missions from Akins who has served as an evangelist, missionary and trainer of church planters in 54 nations.
- Relying on creative ways to carry out its annual Operation Inasmuch day of service during COVID-19, students learned how to use and leverage online personal platforms to benefit and advocate for such organizations as Habitat for Humanity, the Emerald Youth Foundation and C-N's community ministry, Appalachian Outreach.
- The University announced Dr. Jonathan Akin as its new vice president for Church Relations and Campus Ministries. Akin previously served as director of Leadership Development for the NAMB. Akin also serves as associate professor of religion.
- C-N named Jeremiah Young as its new director of Campus Ministries. Young previously served as student pastor at Manley Baptist Church in Morristown.
- The University welcomed Drs. Andrew Burrow and Marshall King as assistant professors of religion.
- Carson-Newman hosted IMB President Paul Chitwood as its Spring Commencement speaker.

Tennessee Baptist Adult Homes, Inc. Report to Associations, 2021

Though I wish that I could report to you that we did not experience any cases of Covid-19 in our homes, I cannot do that. I can, however, report that we had only a few infections and we have been successful in limiting any wider spread. That is because of the faithful men and women who serve as direct care providers in our six group homes. As always, I remain grateful and appreciative for their diligence and vigilance as they joyfully "Show What Love Is."

We were able to get our residents vaccinated very early (January) due to them being a part of a priority group. Because we've been vaccinated, we are again able to conduct placement interviews. We are hopeful to fill our vacant group home beds over the coming months.

I mentioned in last year's report that the proceeds from the sale of Williams Ferry Pointe in Lenoir City were going to be used to help us realize a **two-fold vision** to...

- 1. Establish a significant endowment that will produce operating income. Our Father's Day Offering has never managed to rise to a level to offset our operating deficit.
- 2. Establish a small senior living community in Humboldt on land we already own where we can provide modest, comfortable retirement living (probably duplexes) for financially needy seniors, with priority given to indigent pastors and missionaries. TBAH will own these facilities and rent them on a sliding scale basis. They will be for independent living seniors; we will provide no health care or physical assistance. The Humboldt project will be a TBAH ministry in west Tennessee!!

Part 1 of our vision has been realized through the establishment of the SOAR fund (Supplying Ongoing Aid to Residents) through the Tennessee Baptist Foundation. The SOAR fund is now growing interest that will be used to help offset our operating deficits. Part 2 of the vision will have broken ground and at least one duplex unit will be nearly complete by the time of the 2021 Summit!

Finally, I am sad to report that we had to cancel Special Friends Camp for the second year in a row due to our inability to find vaccinated Counselors. We were able to provide an online "virtual camp" experience with live ZOOM sessions and pre-recorded videos and activities during the week that would have been SFC at Camp Linden. We have every intention of returning to SFC in 2022 and will be using this year to make some major changes to the format and organization of camp so that we will come back fresh and improved.

The *Baptist and Reflector* continues produce and share articles and columns that impact Tennessee Baptist Convention churches. Like the rest of our Tennessee Baptist family, the paper is continuing to minister effectively as our nation still recovers from and continues to deal with COVID-19.

The *B&R* is mailed to more than 17,400 homes 26 weeks a year, reaching nearly 44,000 readers. Last year, we celebrated our 185th anniversary and we are excited that we can continue to tell the story of Tennessee Baptists. Earlier this year, the *B&R* staff was recognized for excellence in journalism by the Baptist Communicators Association in its annual awards competition. The *B&R* was selected as the second best Baptist paper in the nation in terms of both design and content.

In addition, the *B&R* website has grown steadily since it was introduced in late 2015. We continue to experience tremendous growth with our website. Our number of page views continues to grow. We also send out a weekly newsletter highlighting top stories in the print issue but other articles that are posted on the website but may not appear in the print issue.

The goal of the paper is to "tell the story of Tennessee Baptists" through news, feature stories and photographs. As in the past, the paper this year placed a major emphasis on what Tennessee Baptists are doing to reach the world for Christ by focusing on stories related to missions and evangelism. This year the paper has focused on timely topics as churches return to what they were doing before COVID-19 impacted the world in 2020.

The *Baptist and Reflector* continued to utilize social media tools in 2020 such as Twitter and Facebook. Editor Lonnie Wilkey regularly writes a blog that provides information for Tennessee Baptists between print issues.

The staff monitors trends that could affect Tennessee Baptists and prints those stories to keep readers informed. In addition, opinions, both from the editor and others, are printed and are intended to make readers think, reflect, and act.

The paper continually seeks to enlist new subscribers. The Church Trial Plan is still available for churches that want to introduce the paper to is members. We need more churches willing to send the paper to their leadership such as deacons, Sunday School teachers, etc. We are asking every reader of the *B&R* for the next year to consider sending one subscription to someone they know. Tennessee Woman's Missionary Union 2021 Annual Report

In 2020-21, Tennessee WMU challenged Tennessee Baptists to be relentless in living authentic faith in Christ, seeking God in prayer, giving sacrificially, and witnessing to others. This report shares information about some of the state events, ministries, and initiatives that have taken place.

Due to staff transitions and the pandemic, many events where cancelled, some shifted to an online version, and new opportunities were developed

A BEST OF JAM Kit was compiled with some of the favorite JAM activities and lessons from past years and was made available for churches, groups, or families to use with their children.

Virtual Get-Together & Connection was held online on March 20, 2021, with content being available to registrants to view on demand through June 30, 2021. Of the 559 people who registered, at least 444 viewed the online content and they represent over 175 churches. Tennessee Baptist Children's Home received this year's ministry project gifts through an Amazon Wishlist.

As part of Tennessee WMU's Denver prayer advocacy partnership, Virtual Denver Prayer Tours were held from October 2020-August 2021. Each virtual session introduced church planters and allowed participants to pray for them and their families.

Holding the Ropes: Devotions and Praying for Missionaries video series was shown on the Tennessee WMU Facebook pages and groups in late 2020. These daily devotions and prayer times for missionaries were led by older missions-minded youth, young women involved in WMU and missions, WMU Scholarship recipients, and IMB missionaries from Tennessee.

3 Circles Evangelism training video with supporting materials targeted for youth groups was produced and distributed.

Zoom with a Missionary online meetings were hosted allowing missionaries to interact with children/youth missions discipleship groups. There were children's groups from 25 churches who met missionaries from North Africa, Philippines, Italy, Thailand, Spain, Japan, China, North Africa, Venezuela, and from the Unites States – Colorado, Louisiana, and Ohio.

Tennessee WMU joined Sisters Who Care Chattanooga as they hosted a multi-state/regional meeting via Zoom on March 26-28 with over 80 in attendance. Sisters Who Care is the African American expression of Women on Mission.

Covid restrictions opened up for Tennessee WMU to be able to host a very scaled back Annual Meeting on May 1, 2021, at First Baptist Church, Cookeville. Highlights from the meeting were reports of the work of Tennessee WMU in the past year, the approval of recommended Bylaw revisions and the election of the 2021-22 Tennessee WMU Officers & Regional Promotion Directors.

Christmas Checks –Tennessee WMU mailed Christmas Checks, on behalf of Tennessee Baptists to missionary kids and retired missionaries.

- Checks for \$150 were sent to 20 missionary kids whose parents serve with IMB and are from Tennessee.
- Checks for \$50 were sent to 94 retired IMB missionaries who were born in Tennessee.

These gifts are made possible through an allocation from the Golden Offering for Tennessee Missions for nurturing Tennessee missionaries and their families.

In April 2021, \$35,275 in scholarships were awarded to 34 students attending graduate school, seminary, as well as undergraduate schools in Tennessee during the 2021-22 school year. These scholarships are funded through endowments, invested funds, and the Golden Offering for Tennessee Missions.

Christian Women's Job Corps and Christian Men's Job Corps are ministries of WMU that seek to help men and women break the cycle of poverty through job and life skill classes, Bible study, and mentoring. Last year the 21 sites in Tennessee reported serving 425 participants.

Missionary Houses in Mt. Juliet – Mary's House (WMU House) and the Missions Mobilization Center (MMC) House continue to be a hub of activity as they provide a place for our missionaries to rest and reconnect with family and friends. The Worthy family arrived at Mary's House in June 2020 and have extended their stay through February 2022. After staying at the MMC Missions House for a year, Frank & Sheri Moran moved out on April 30, 2021. Jason & Jennifer Vanover moved into the MMC Missions House on May 20, 2021 and will be staying through January 31, 2022.

The theme for the 2020-21 Tennessee Missions Emphasis was "See and Tell Tennessee." The suggested dates for the Week of Prayer for State Missions were September 13-20, and the goal for the 2020-21 Golden Offering for Tennessee Missions was \$1,800,000. The total amount given as of July 27, 2021, was \$1,686,665, The offering year goes from September 1 – August 31.

For we are laborers together with God, encouraging and equipping churches and individuals to engage in missions learning and involvement that enables to them to fulfill the Great Commission.

North American Mission Board 2021 Annual Report for Southern Baptist Associations

The reason behind everything we do at the North American Mission Board (NAMB) is to help Southern Baptists make disciples for Jesus in North America and beyond.

2020 was a challenging year, but at NAMB, the mission moves forward. We did not have to pull a single missionary from the field due to budget. We have not cut evangelism funds, and no missionary has had his or her funding reduced. We will continue to do whatever it takes to protect essential ministries.

Our church planting missionaries have been serving their communities courageously throughout the COVID-19 crisis. So many have delivered food, served healthcare workers and provided much-needed encouragement and hope to their neighbors.

Even during the pandemic, Southern Baptists planted 588 new churches in 2020. That is an increase of 36 over the previous year. In addition, 143 churches chose to affiliate with Southern Baptists and 126 new campuses were added for a total of 857 new congregations added in 2020.

Our Send Relief missionaries and ministry centers served thousands. Hundreds of thousands of meals were prepared and distributed. Frontline healthcare workers received thousands of pieces of personal protective equipment. Our missionaries and ministry partners served vulnerable populations every day.

Throughout the challenges of this past year, we have continued to provide pastors with the tools they need to proclaim the gospel and equip their congregations for evangelism. Our Who's Your One Tour with Johnny Hunt continued in both in-person and virtual formats. We are expanding our student evangelism resources, and we added Paul Worcester as National Director of Collegiate Evangelism to help Southern Baptists reach this critical next generation of students.

We are also adding to our leadership resources with Next Step Leader, led by Will Mancini, an established leader in Christian ministry. At this critical time when pastors need new tools in their leadership toolbox, this free training will help every pastor in our Southern Baptist family.

Pastor care is more important now than ever as we seek to encourage and build up the men who lead our churches. This is why we continue to serve pastors through our Timothy+Branabas events across North America. In the year ahead, we are looking to expand and bring this conference to additional places so we can bring healing and encouragement to many more pastors.

We are grateful for how you support our nearly 6,000 missionaries and chaplains. The Annie Armstrong Easter Offering directly provides for your missionaries in North America, and before this past year, we saw three years of record Annie offering totals. What a remarkable trend! Last year, just as most churches would have been receiving the Annie offering, they were closing their doors and going into lockdown because of the pandemic. Giving dropped to \$49.3 million, but there is still great reason to celebrate.

Thank you, Southern Baptists, for allowing us to serve and partner with you. We are grateful for what every church is doing to reach its community and join arms in the effort to reach North America and the world for Christ.
